The biography shown below is from Peterson's campaign website. In this biography, Peterson states that he has partial ownership of multiple businesses and first held office in 1995 as a Wilmington City Council member:

Harper grew up on a farm in Huntington, NY, sharing a two bedroom house with his parents, five siblings, and grandparents. It was there he learned the importance of a strong work ethic, gratitude, and caring for others less fortunate, values he has carried with him throughout his life.

A graduate of The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Harper was inducted into the institution's oldest and most prestigious honors society, the Order of the Golden Fleece, and received All-American honors in lacrosse. Upon graduating, he volunteered as an English teacher in Thailand before moving to New Hanover County in the '70s. Harper is married, has five children and one grandson, and he and his wife Plunkett are partners in several local businesses.

Harper served on Wilmington City Council from 1995-1999, and as Wilmington Mayor from 2001-2003. He is a founding member of Cape Fear River Watch and Clean Cape Fear, established the Northside Plan, Affordable Housing Task Force, Mayor's Task Force on Disabilities, Mayor's Task Force on the Arts, served on the NC General Assembly's Wilmington 1898 Race Riot Commission 2001-2006, and has been a staunch advocate for the Film Industry. He has been instrumental in spearheading a variety of economic development activities including the New Hanover County Room Occupancy Tax, Northside Plan and sustaining the Wilmington Riverwalk initiative.



State Board of Elections Records Show that Peterson Has Voted in 27 out of 28 Presidential Preference Elections, Primary Elections, and General Elections since November 1992 – Peterson Has Failed to Vote in Five Out of Six "Second Primary" Elections since May 1998

State Board of Elections records show that Peterson has voted in 27 out of 28 presidential preference elections, primary elections, and general elections since November 1992 (the extent of the voting history made available on the State Board of Elections website). He only failed to vote in the May 2014 primary election.

These records also show that Peterson has failed to vote in five out of six "second primary" elections since May 1998. ("Election Results," ncsbe.gov)

- Peterson voted in the June 1998 "second primary."
- Peterson failed to vote in the June 2016, July 2012, June 2010, June 2008, and August 2004
 "second primary" elections all of which had at least one race for which registered
 Democrats in New Hanover County could cast a vote.
- Note that the "second primary" elections in June 2018, July 2014, and May 2006 did not appear to have any races for which registered Democrats in New Hanover County could cast a vote.
- No "second primary" elections appear to have been held in 2002 and 2000.







In April 2019, the *Carteret County News-Times* reported that SB 517 would "prohibit the exploration, development and production of offshore oil and gas in North Carolina coastal waters."

HEADLINE: Democrats introduce bills opposing offshore drilling

Two coastal legislators are primary architects of companion bills introduced in the General Assembly on April 3. The short title attached to both <u>Senate Bill 517</u> and House Bill 545 is "Protect the Military/Fisheries/Tourism."

The full description, however, is: "An act to prohibit the exploration, development and production of offshore oil and gas in North Carolina coastal waters in order to protect military operations, commercial and recreational fishing and tourism, and the billions of dollars they contribute annually to the coastal economy and the state as a whole"







Searches of the Brunswick County Tax Office found that Peterson has made 24 delinquent property tax payments in New Hanover County. These late payments have resulted in Peterson paying a total of \$1,655.87 in additional interest and fees to the county.

Note that these searches found hundreds of additional property tax payments made by Peterson's affiliated companies in Brunswick County. These payments were not comprehensively reviewed to determine how many were delinquent and the total amount of interest and fees that were paid to the county as a result of the late payments. A random sampling, however, found that a portion of the payments of these property tax payments were delinquent. In 2002, the Wilmington Star News Reported that Peterson Had Been the Defendant in Six Traffic Infraction Cases – in One Case, Peterson Was Charged with "Driving while Impaired" but that Charge Was Later Dismissed Due to "No Probable Cause"

In 2002, the *Wilmington Star News* reported that Peterson had been the defendant in six traffic infraction cases. In one of these traffic infraction cases, Peterson was charged with "driving while impaired" but that charge was later dismissed due to "no probable cause."

HEADLINE: Council has seen its share of tickets

All but one member of the Wilmington City Council have received traffic citations, but the Police Department didn't have videotapes or audiotapes of any of those incidents.

Mayor Harper Peterson, who is white, has been cited six times since 1984. He had the most traffic citations of all the council members, according to Clerk of Court records. Mr. Peterson refused Friday to answer questions from the Morning Star unless they were submitted in writing. The newspaper doesn't usually submit written questions to elected officials.

Mr. Peterson pleaded guilty in 1984 to having an expired driver's license. He pleaded guilty in separate incidents in 1988 and 1989 on charges of having expired tags.

He was charged in December 1994 with displaying a fictitious, canceled, revoked or altered registration or tag. He failed to appear in court on the charge, but then pleaded guilty in May 1995. He was sentenced to "prayer for judgement continued," which is usually reserved for first-time or minor offenses. It allows the charges to be dropped after a certain amount of time if he obeys the law.

He pleaded guilty, also in 1995, to having an expired tag, but the earlier charge that resulted in a prayer for judgement continued wasn't activated.

In 1996, Mr. Peterson was charged with driving while impaired and failure to be in possession of his license. At the time, he said he had forgotten his license. After a breath-analysis test detected no alcohol in his blood, a magistrate found no probable cause and dismissed the case.

A.9 – Taught Victorian Poetry in Thailand to Avoid Military Service in Vietnam

In a 2006 Interview, Peterson Said that He Was a Conscientious Objector during the Vietnam War and Spent Two Years in Thailand Teaching English and Poetry – Peterson also Described His Time in Thailand as "Exciting" and that He "Traveled Quite a Bit"

In an Oct. 24, 2006, interview with the University of North Carolina Wilmington, Peterson said that he was a conscientious objector during the Vietnam War (after graduating from college in 1970) and spent two years in Thailand teaching English and Victorian Poetry. Peterson also described his time in Thailand as "exciting" and that He "traveled quite a bit."

HEADLINE: Interview with Harper Peterson

Harper Peterson: Well, I was a Conscientious Objector. This was during the Vietnam War. And as a result, I did my service in Thailand. I decided not to stay at home. Typically, a CO would stay at home and work in a hospital or with the municipality. But I chose to go to Thailand and work there. Jones: In what capacity?

Harper Peterson: I was an educator for my first year. I was an English Teacher. I majored in Anthropology in College, but went over with the North American Presbyterian Church and was a secondary school, high school teacher in English as second language for a year. And then, the second year, I taught English at Thomas Ott University. I taught Victorian Poetry, which I never studied. In fact, the students knew more than I did. But the fact that I was a foreigner, and it was a high honor to have a foreigner teaching—

Jones: So how long were you in Thailand?

Harper Peterson: I was there two years. The funny thing about Thomas Ott, today it's the University where attorneys are born in Thailand. So I put that on my resume now that I taught at the legal school in Thailand. But also, worked in the Northern Thailand, In Chiang Mai, Chaing Rai, with hill [ph?] tribes. The Queen Mother at the time had a program trying to steer farmers away from the opium trade. That's the Golden Triangle Thailand, Burma,

_______. And I worked with her program in Northern Thailand trying to introduce handicrafts as an alternative to the opium trade.

Jones: That's a good trade off.

Harper Peterson: So it was an eventful, exciting two years. I traveled quite a bit in the Far East and then—

We were very close to that. And returned and came back to Chapel Hill, worked with the City for about a year, with the Recreation Department. And I was the Student Coordinator Director, taught theatre and recreational activities...

Harper Peterson: I fell in love with the South and had not been to Wilmington before 1972. When we would take a weekend off from school, we typically would go to Myrtle Beach or to Nagsine [ph]. They were closer. They didn't have I-40 back then. So Wilmington Wrightsville Beach was off the radar screen for weekend fun. So it was after I left Chapel Hill as an employee, myself and three friends, took my father's sailboat, a 40-foot sailboat, and pursued our dreams in the Caribbean. And we worked our way down. Jones: Doing what, just sailing?

Harper Peterson: Teaching sailing.

On December 10, 2019, the *Wilmington Port City Daily* reported that Peterson had filed for reelection in North Carolina Senate District 9 and will face a rematch with Republican Michael Lee. Peterson only narrowly defeated Lee in the 2018 election cycle.



Instead, bowing to the desires of Cape Fear Community College, the mayor talks of putting the center somewhere else - and possibly splitting it into two stations a couple of blocks apart. What an odd "center" that would be.

Mr. Peterson says he removed Ms. Padgett from the Transportation Advisory Committee because "a stronger voice is needed." In reality, what he seems to want is a "stronger voice" that agrees with him and his allies.

Mr. Peterson says he also is concerned about "council conduct, and in establishing a positive attitude." That apparently means nodding politely when he proposes something dreamed up in meetings from which potential skeptics have been excluded. To question such an idea and to cite arguments against it, is, in Mr. Peterson's words, "disruptive" and to engage in "personal attack and disruptive strategy."

It is an odd way of leading, particularly for a politician who talks so much about "openness and inclusiveness" and invites everyone's opinions at a dizzying procession of public meetings.

But perhaps Mr. Peterson doesn't believe he needs to lead. He knows that on most issues, he can count on three cooperative council members to back him. (Certainly Jason Thompson, who says, "you have to play with the team and can't be on the opposite side" - or think for yourself, evidently.)

The mayor condescendingly invites the quiet and thoughtful Ms. Padgett to "participate in a productive, civil and cooperative manner."

The key word is "cooperative." She'll be just fine if she's a good girl who does what she's told.

Of course, the important issue here isn't the way the mayor gets along with one council member, but the way he leads the city to deal with its problems and plan for its future.

Mr. Peterson talks a good game. But what he has mainly accomplished so far is to decapitate the city staff, re-open issues that had been settled, and divide the council and the city.

In September 2002, the *Wilmington Morning Star* reported that the NAACP had criticized Peterson and the City of Wilmington for not doing enough to stop racism and sexism after a white firefighter used a racial slur in reference to a black female fire captain.

The engineer was put on a two-week suspension but New Hanover County NAACP head Reb John Fredlaw stated he had not received a satisfactory response from Peterson or other Wilmington city officials about additional sanctions being taken against the firefighter.

<u>HEADLINE</u>: Dangerous Words; NAACP: Fire him; Racial slur hasn't cost man his job despite city policy

The flames of racism and sexism have been stoked within the Wilmington Fire Department, and the city hasn't done enough to put them out, the NAACP said Friday.

The Rev. John Fredlaw, head of the New Hanover County branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said the city has not reacted severely enough in reprimanding a white male engineer who used racist, sexist terms in speaking to a black female fire captain in January.

The engineer - the person who drives the fire truck - Donald Ragavage, denied making the remark Friday but said he wouldn't comment further. The 12-year veteran of the fire department directed comments to Raleigh attorney Travis Payne...

Rev. Fredlaw said the slurs were lobbed at Cassandra Sidberry, the first black woman hired in the Wilmington Fire Department, the first woman promoted to captain and one of only three black women in the department.

Capt. Sidberry, who has been with the department since 1984, declined to comment Friday because she was at work. She said she didn't think she should take the city's time to talk about the incident.

But Rev. Fredlaw wasn't bound by the city's rules. He explained Capt. Sidberry called the fire station where Mr. Ragavage works in January to tell the crew a former firefighter had died. Mr. Ragavage responded several times by saying "Yes, sir," even after she warned him that he was on thin ice.

After a back-and-forth between the two, Mr. Ragavage said he wouldn't call Capt. Sidberry "ma'am," then he fired the offensive terms at her, Rev. Fredlaw said.

Rev. Fredlaw said he has a signed statement from one of Mr. Ragavage's superiors, who says he overheard the incident.

Rev. Fredlaw said Capt. Sidberry has spent the past eight months trying to follow the city's protocol for reporting the incident, but so far, all that has happened is that Mr. Ragavage was suspended for 14 days in the spring. The suspension could not be confirmed, however, with all city officials refusing to comment on "a personnel matter."

Rev. Fredlaw said the two-week suspension flouted the city's "no tolerance" policy on racism and that Mr. Ragavage should be fired...

Rev. Fredlaw said suspension isn't good enough. He said he met with city officials, including Mayor Harper Peterson, interim City Manager Ed Fare and City Attorney Tom Pollard, several months ago and still hasn't received a satisfactory response. He said he asked Mr. Peterson to inform the City Council of the incident.

Friday afternoon, Mr. Peterson said he didn't remember details of the meeting and therefore couldn't comment on it, although he said, "I'm sure I told him it was a personnel issue and had to be handled by the city attorney and the city manager."

The mayor added he is "concerned about anything about racial discrimination," and he will discuss the incident with the City Council on Monday...

Rev. Fredlaw told the story while standing outside City Hall where he and a delegation of members of the NAACP and the International Association of Black Professional Fire Fighters met to hand-deliver a letter to members of the Wilmington City Council.

The letter, from the head of the firefighters' association, describes the work environment as "abusive" with regard to sex and ethnicity.

Rather than working with his City Manager Peterson chose to fire her. The *Wilmington Star News* wrote that under Peterson's tenure as Wilmington Mayor "The city's relationship with New Hanover County has reached rock bottom" and "Wilmington's reputation for dysfunctional government and a chaotic and inexplicably hostile business climate has spread statewide."

EDITORIAL HEADLINE: Two more years would be too much

Wilmington Mayor Harper Peterson has used his office's limited powers energetically during the past two years. He has invited residents to offer comments on a long list of issues - a welcome and healthy step, particularly for black residents, many of whom have felt frozen out of city affairs.

He has offered a stream of ideas and proposals and sparked many a meeting to discuss the city's future. Again, that was a good thing. Too often, mayors and councils seem to get bogged down in the day-to-day running of the city and lose sight of where they ought to be leading it.

The mayor also shares credit for getting a room tax passed to help finance a downtown convention center.

The issue for voters on Tuesday isn't Mr. Peterson's policies, but the way he pursues them. More fundamentally, the issue is Mr. Peterson's style of leadership.

It's fine to change things that need changing. It's admirable to take firm and principled stands. But it's wise to make reasonable efforts to persuade others to join you, or at least to respect their opinions.

Mr. Peterson often seems to view those who disagree with him as enemies. It appears he would rather run over people than win them over.

Instead of setting new goals for the city manager and seeing whether she met them, the incoming mayor, with the votes of his frequent supporters, fired her.

Mr. Peterson also failed to be candid with her or the public. Asked about rumors that he wanted to get rid of the manager, among others, the incoming mayor strongly implied that he would not; at one point, he said he was not coming into office with a drawn sword. The next thing anybody knew, that sword beheaded the city staff.

The unexplained firing and the deceptive game of words was a fitting opening to Mr. Peterson's term as mayor. More of the same followed.

The city's relationship with New Hanover County has reached rock bottom.

The mayor and his allies have overturned established decisions and policies, called for more studies, overworked a stretched-thin city staff, hired consultants and left other government officials and business people baffled about what's next.

Mr. Peterson seems to believe the mayor should run the city. But that is not the form of government under which Wilmington operates.

During this mayor's term, <u>Wilmington's reputation for dysfunctional government and a</u> chaotic and inexplicably hostile business climate has spread statewide.

Before Mr. Peterson was elected, his supporters assured skeptics that he had changed since his disagreeable and often unproductive stint on the City Council.

But he hasn't changed. He has simply been given more power...

A lot of Wilmingtonians have had enough.

His early days representing New Hanover County in the N.C. Senate are going to feel like when he left for college, N.C. Sen.-elect Harper Peterson said.

"Obviously, I've served at the local level, but it's a different environment," said Peterson, a former Wilmington mayor and city council member who defeated N.C. Sen. Michael Lee, R-New Hanover, in November's election. "So I'm a student right now. I'm back and forth to Raleigh just kind of learning the ropes."

That doesn't mean the soon-to-be <u>Democratic freshman senator doesn't have a laundry list of issues he would like to address</u>, including doing more to address emerging contaminants in the Cape Fear region's drinking water, advocating for the return to the state's former film incentive program from its current grant program and <u>pushing for Medicaid expansion</u> to help tackle the opioid epidemic...

This bill was filed jointly in the House and Senate...

This bill would allow individuals under the following criteria to be eligible for Medicaid benefits:

- Age range: 19-65
- Not entitled or enrolled in Medicare Part A or B
- Not otherwise eligible for Medicaid coverage currently

Benefits would be received through an Alternative Benefit Plan established by DHHS. The co-payments for benefits would be the same as current Medicaid beneficiaries.

The start date would be effective on the date that capitated coverage begins.

The bill states that it is the intent of the NCGA to enact legislation to replace the Hospital Provider Assessment with a similar hospital provider assessment. It is the intent to impose upon these same hospital providers a Mediciad Coverage Gap Assessment that will pay for the state share of the program and the administrative costs of Medicaid expansion.

Berger noted that Medicaid expansion would cost "approximately \$173 million per year" with the state paying for those additional costs through "taxing the state's hospitals and insurance companies." Additionally, Berger warned that rising costs could crowd out vulnerable populations such as "the 12,000 disabled North Carolinians with severe developmental needs currently on the waitlist for the state's optional Intellectual/Development Disability (IDD) Medicaid program."

OPINION ARTICLE HEADLINE: The other side of Medicaid expansion

"Expand Medicaid!" "Don't expand Medicaid!" Welcome to one of the most significant debates in the current session of North Carolina's General Assembly.

Gov. Roy Cooper and legislative Democrats have made expanding Medicaid their number one goal for the 2019 legislative session. Republican legislators remain wary about both the policy and fiscal merits of Medicaid expansion in North Carolina. The governor's director of legislative affairs has even been quoted in the media saying, "The session ends when we get Medicaid expansion." There's also an ongoing guessing game as to whether Cooper will veto any budget passed by the legislature if it doesn't include Medicaid expansion.

The argument for Medicaid expansion goes something like this — there are people in the state that do not currently have health insurance coverage; Medicaid expansion provides insurance for every adult in the state whose income is less than 133 percent of the federal poverty level; 90 percent of the cost of the program is paid by the federal government, and expanding Medicaid will solve all sorts of current problems such as rural hospital closings and the opioid crisis.

Hearing those arguments you may wonder why North Carolina isn't already on board the Medicaid expansion bandwagon. Well, like many things that sound too good to be true, there is another side to the story. A full accounting of the facts leads to the inescapable conclusion that expanding Medicaid would be a mistake that not only will fail to solve the problems its proponents claim it solves, but will create new problems and rekindle problems that have just recently been put to rest – such as Medicaid cost overruns and yearly budget deficits.

Let's take a closer look at how the arguments for Medicaid expansion hold up. First, the claim that Medicaid will provide insurance coverage for approximately 500,000 people that don't currently have coverage. The truth is, approximately 300,000 of those 500,000 — 60 percent — are either eligible for government-subsidized health coverage through the federal exchange or are already receiving health insurance through their employer. The actual "coverage gap" only exists for less than half of the expansion population. And who is in that gap? Children? No; children in low-income families are already eligible for Medicaid. Low-income pregnant women? No; they are also currently eligible. How about severely disabled individuals? No; already eligible. The truth is that the vast majority of those who would become eligible for coverage under Medicaid expansion are able-bodied adults between the ages of 18 and 50.

Ok; but it's "free" money; why not take it? You've been told that the money is "free" because the federal government currently pays 90 percent of the cost of Medicaid expansion, and the state will only be on the hook for 10 percent — approximately \$173 million per year. And that cost will be paid by taxing the state's hospitals and insurance companies. But what will the state do when the federal government changes the rules and pays less than 90 percent? In fact, the same thing just happened with the children's health program. The federal government changed its match rate, blowing a \$140 million hole in our budget and forcing the state to come up with the additional funds to continue the program.

In other states, expansion enrollment has far exceeded projections, increasing the financial pressure on other important budget items. Likely the first victims of expansion crowding out funding will be the 12,000 disabled North Carolinians with severe developmental needs currently on the waitlist for the state's optional Intellectual/Development Disability (IDD) Medicaid program. Medicaid expansion would force these folks to continue waiting at the back of the line as able-bodied adults receive care.

Governor Cooper made a counter-offer this past week that insists on implementing Obamacare's Medicaid expansion, a deal-breaker for most legislative Republicans, rejects the General Assembly-passed franchise tax cut, and spends even more money than his initial proposal. Based on the way things are going, it is very plausible that no deal is reached.

Implementing Obamacare's Medicaid expansion in North Carolina, which is Governor Cooper's top priority, would cost \$6 billion over the next two years, which represents a 28% percent increase in Medicaid spending and a roughly 8% increase in total state spending.

Among the 37 states that have expanded Medicaid in accordance with Obamacare, cautionary tales about its affordability abound...

The new budget approved by the North Carolina General Assembly would have the state continue to serve as a model for pro-growth fiscal policy and spending restraint, a model that many New York and Washington-based pundits will continue to ignore while obsessing over a much smaller state. The budget Governor Cooper is demanding would lead to a large uptick in Medicaid spending that will crowd out other state spending priorities and necessitate tax hikes. We'll soon find out which side wins this argument...

Medicaid is a program funded jointly by the state and federal government. Its core functions include paying medical providers for services rendered to low-income parents, children, pregnant women, the elderly, the blind, and the disabled.

The federal government currently funds two-thirds of North Carolina's \$14 billion Medicaid program. The Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare, allows states to expand Medicaid eligibility to individuals earning up to 138 percent of the federal poverty level. This figure equates to an individual earning \$17,236 per year or a family of four earning \$35,535. As of December 2019, North Carolina was one of 14 states that have not expanded Medicaid.

If North Carolina had chosen to expand Medicaid in 2014, the federal government would have fully funded its cost through 2017. States were then responsible for financing a portion of the total expense, reaching a maximum of 10 percent by 2020...

Federal funding of Medicaid expansion and other health care entitlements will necessitate either higher levels of deficit spending, which adds to the multitrillion-dollar federal debt, or substantial increases in taxes, which impedes economic growth.



The Conservative American Action Forum published a paper analyzing the specific costs of the Green New Deal plan proposed in February 2019 by Rep. Ocasio-Cortez, including the Medicare for All single-payer healthcare proposal. The Conservative American Action Forum found that Medicare for All would cost taxpayers an estimated \$36 trillion between 2020 and 2029.

D. Universal Health Care

To analyze the GND promise for universal health care, we build on the estimate by the Center for Health and Economy (H&E) of the Medicare for All proposal by 2016 presidential candidate Bernie Sanders. In particular, we make several assumptions.

There is Limited Plan Choice. A single-payer system would eliminate consumer choice relative to how insurance is currently administered. Thus there would be no plan choices outside of an actuarial value range that is comparable to the current actuarial value of Medicare.

Actuarial Values of Plans. Current Medicare beneficiaries receive insurance with an actuarial value in the 70 to 80 percent range. We assume that these are the most bare-bones options and permit the equivalent of current individual market health insurance plans with Gold metal levels.

Administrative Savings: We adopt the H&E estimate of the decrease in administrative costs. Total Government Spending. All costs to the consumer are eliminated by converting all health insurance-related costs into federal spending.

<u>Under these assumptions the universal coverage will cost roughly \$36 trillion between 2020 and 2029</u>. In addition to the tax cost and diminished choice, one would expect decreased access to providers, particularly among those who currently have health coverage.



In February 2019, the *Washington Free Beacon* reported that a study by the American Action Forum had found that the Green New Deal could cost up to \$94.4 trillion over 10 Years to implement. This would cost each household in the U.S. more than \$600,000 over ten years. Note that these estimated costs included all the elements of the Green New Deal plan that had been proposed by Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, including universal healthcare. Additional details about Peterson's support for universal healthcare is provided in a separate chapter of this report.

HEADLINE: Study: Green New Deal Would Cost Up to \$94 Trillion

The "Green New Deal" would cost up to \$94.4 trillion, or over \$600,000 per household in the United States, according to a new study.

The American Action Forum study offers a conservative estimate of the costs of providing every resident in the country a federal job with benefits, "adequate" housing, "healthy food," and health care.

Though Democratic socialist Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez's (D., N.Y.) plan is vague on specifics, it calls for the "economic transformation" of the United States, a complete overhaul of transportation systems, and retrofitting every single building. A supplemental document explaining the plan, since deleted from her website after it was widely mocked on social media, called for economic security for everyone, even those "unwilling to work," the elimination of air travel, and "farting cows."

However, the American Action Forum was able to calculate estimates for several items the plan does propose, including guaranteed green housing, universal health care, and food security. Estimates of specific goals identified in the Green New Deal would cost each household in America between \$36,100 and \$65,300 every year.

"The American Action Forum's analysis shows that the Green New Deal would bankrupt the nation," said Sen. John Barrasso (R., Wyo.), chairman of the Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works.

"On the upper end, every American household would have to pay \$65,000 per year to foot the bill," he said. "The total price tag would be \$93 trillion over 10 years. That is roughly four times the value of all Fortune 500 companies combined. That's no deal."...

The American Action Forum calculated guaranteed green housing would cost between \$1.6 trillion and \$4.2 trillion; a federal jobs guarantee between \$6.8 trillion and \$44.6 trillion; a net zero emissions transportation system between \$1.3 trillion and \$2.7 trillion; a low-carbon electricity grid for \$5.4 trillion; and "food security" for \$1.5 billion.

Enough high-speed rail "to make air travel unnecessary," would cost roughly \$1.1 to \$2.5 trillion. Universal Health Care, or a Medicare-for-all type plan, would cost \$36 trillion over 10 years, totaling \$260,000 per household in the United States.

Many of the figures are conservative estimates. For instance, researchers assumed obtaining a low-carbon electricity grid would require no new construction of transmission assets, when in actuality, such a grid would require new infrastructure.

"The Green New Deal is clearly very expensive," the American Action Forum said. "Its further expansion of the federal government's role in some of the most basic decisions of daily life, however, would likely have a more lasting and damaging impact than its enormous price tag."

In all, the plan would cost between \$52.6 trillion and \$94.4 trillion, over 10 years. The burden to the taxpayer would amount to between \$361,010 and \$653,010 for each household over 10 years.

Electricity rates would necessarily skyrocket under such a plan.

Ocasio-Cortez's funding scheme hits the price-level from both sides of this equation. 

Vox called 350.org and founder Bill McKibben the "radical flank" of environmentalism. The article explained how the radical tactics used by McKibben could be used by "activists with positions and demands outside the current mainstream," such as those that want to legalize drugs. It cites a paper by the journal Organization & Environment that "charts the effect that Bill McKibben, his organization 350.org, and their campaign" have had on the climate change debate.

HEADLINE: The McKibben effect: a case study in how radical environmentalism can work

One of the perennial debates in politics is over the role of radicals — activists with positions and demands outside the current mainstream. Think hard drug legalizers, advocates for a universal basic income, or, on the right, those who want to repeal the 17th Amendment. (Yes, this is a thing on the right now.)...

A new paper, forthcoming in the journal Organization & Environment, takes a fresh look at this dynamic in the context of the climate movement. Specifically, it seeks to chart the effects that Bill McKibben, his organization 350.org, and their campaign to get big institutions to divest from fossil fuels have had on the public climate change debate.

<u>Is there a McKibben Effect — a radical flank effect on the US climate debate?</u> And is it positive or negative?

Todd Schifeling (of Temple University) and Andrew John Hoffman (of University of Michigan) set out to examine this question empirically.

Their starting point is that much research has been done on the direct interactions of activist interest groups and business/academic/political groups, but much less has been done on the indirect effects of radical flanking. It may be that a radical campaign does not succeed at achieving its own stated goals, but causes important shifts elsewhere in the debate.

This, more or less, is what they speculate is true of McKibben/350.org's divestment campaign. Shortly after the 2010 midterms, students began advocating that their universities divest from investments in fossil fuels. McKibben and 350 took up the charge and popularized it, to the point that, as of today, 749 institutions are participating, worth about \$5.53 trillion in investments.

Schifeling and Hoffman acknowledge that the divestment movement has not — and, realistically, probably cannot — accomplish its goal of substantially affecting the financial health of large fossil fuel companies.

But that was not its only aim. It also set out to remove the "social license" of fossil fuel companies to operate, to cast them as moral outlaws like cigarette makers. And it was paired, in 2012, with McKibben's widely read "Global Warming's Terrifying New Math," which made clear that the vast bulk of existing fossil fuel reserves could not be developed in a climate-safe world — that fossil fuel companies' interests were at odds with humanity's interests.

To measure the indirect effects of that radical framing, Schifeling and Hoffman compiled an enormous database of newspaper stories about climate change published between 2011 and 2015. Using software wizardry (uh, details in the paper), they analyze the stories in three steps.

First, they look for the rise of mentions of the radical flank — the actors (McKibben and 350) and their policy demand (divestment). Second, they look at the process by which the demand becomes dissociated from the actors and enters mainstream dialogue. And third, they look at other changes in the structure of the debate.

With just a little courage from Democratic legislators, we could actually be building a world that is safer on every front.





The largest and fastest-growing source of nutrient pollution in our waterways is the poultry industry, according to the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality. But the industry operates with so little regulation that state doesn't even know where poultry operations are located, much less have good information on the impacts.

- North Carolina's 515 million chickens and turkeys produce 5 million tons (ten billion pounds!) of waste each year.
- Roughly 4.2 million chickens and turkeys drowned following Hurricane Florence, according to the state. Composting their carcasses cost the state and federal governments a total of \$12.6 million.
- There are more than 56 million birds in the Neuse and Tar-Pamlico basins combined
- From 2008 to 2018, 87 new poultry operations were built in the Neuse and Tar-Pamlico, adding nearly 13 million new birds and their waste in the two basins

In August 2018, the Raleigh News & Observer published a story about lawsuits against the hog farm industry awarding millions in damages. The North Carolina chapter of the Sierra Club supported and praised these lawsuits stating, "Once again, a jury of North Carolina citizens has sent a message that Smithfield needs to clean up its act."

Republican Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler warned, "If we don't do something about it right now there is not a farm in this country that is going to be safe."

HEADLINE: Jury awards hog farm neighbors their biggest verdict yet

A federal jury on Friday awarded more than \$470 million to six neighbors of a hog farm in Pender County who complained of excessive noise, odor, flies, buzzards and other disruptions to their quality of life.

The stunning verdict, reached after just three hours of deliberation, came against pork producer Murphy-Brown, and marked the third time that juries have ruled against the company in a nuisance lawsuit. At \$473.5 million, this was the largest of the three.

The first two verdicts were reduced in line with state law capping punitive damages. The cap will lower the amount to \$94 million in total damages in this case.

The jury awarded \$75 million each in punitive damages to the six neighbors, and \$3 million to \$5 million each in compensatory damages, according to court documents.

The verdict came in as dozens of national and state politicians and agricultural officials convened across town at the State Fairgrounds. The roundtable event, which was carried live online, was meant to galvanize national opposition to these North Carolina lawsuits that have triggered panic in the agricultural industry.

"If we don't do something about it right now there is not a farm in this country that is going to be safe," N.C. Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler told the gathering. "... This has got to stop. Farmers are being put out of business because of this."

There are 26 lawsuits with more than 500 plaintiffs suing Murphy-Brown. The lawsuits were consolidated in 2015. These first three trials were among five initial lawsuits designated to go to trial, giving both sides an opportunity to gauge the strengths and weaknesses of their cases. The lawsuits are expected to be resolved in appeals court or through a settlement at some point.

The first two trials ended with verdicts against Murphy-Brown with multimillion-dollar awards. The third trial began more than four weeks ago.

Pork Council: 'Outrageous" verdict

The N.C. Pork Council issued a statement calling the verdict "outrageous."

The state chapter of The Sierra Club praised the verdict, saying hog producers are using outdated technology that sprays fields with waste water from lagoons.

"Once again, a jury of North Carolina citizens has sent a message that Smithfield needs to clean up its act," Sierra Club government relations director Cassie Gavin said in an email. "Air and water pollution and odors from factory hog farms have been a problem in our state since the explosive growth of these operations in the 1990s. ... The hog industry should improve its waste management and state lawmakers should require better practices to protect the public health and the environment."

The six neighbors in the latest lawsuit, who live in five homes, argued that the disruption from the hog farms, while not consistently offensive, could be staggering.

On April 13, 2020, NPR published a story on the recent closures of meat processing plants due to the Coronavirus epidemic. Smithfield Foods CEO Kenneth Sullivan warned that "It is impossible to keep our grocery stores stocked if our plants are not running." Sullivan also stated that "The closure of this facility, combined with a growing list of other protein plants that have shuttered across our industry, is pushing our country perilously close to the edge in terms of our meat supply."

HEADLINE: U.S. Meat Supply Is 'Perilously Close' To A Shortage, CEO Warns

One of the country's largest pork-producing plants closed indefinitely after nearly 300 of its employees tested positive for COVID-19. And the company's CEO warned that the coronavirus pandemic is pushing the nation's meat supply "perilously close" to the edge.

"It is impossible to keep our grocery stores stocked if our plants are not running," Smithfield Foods CEO Kenneth Sullivan said in a statement.

Smithfield decided to close its plant in Sioux Falls, S.D., which provides 4% to 5% of the pork produced in the United States. The move came after South Dakota Gov. Kristi Noem urged the company to "do more" to address the pandemic.

"The closure of this facility, combined with a growing list of other protein plants that have shuttered across our industry, is pushing our country perilously close to the edge in terms of our meat supply," Sullivan said.

Smithfield is one of several meat-producing companies that have suspended or cut back on production in recent weeks.

JBS USA has closed a Souderton, Pa., beef plant until at least Thursday and has reduced production at a second facility in Greeley, Colo., because of high absenteeism among employees.

Cargill and Tyson Foods have also closed plants in Pennsylvania and Iowa.

Sullivan warned that the growing shutdowns are hurting the nation's meat supply in a way that is reaching throughout the U.S. economy.

"These facility closures will also have severe, perhaps disastrous, repercussions for many in the supply chain, first and foremost our nation's livestock farmers. These farmers have nowhere to send their animals," he wrote.


Because meat is perishable it must be kept in cold storage, making it difficult for stores to carry large amounts of inventory, says Krista Foster, who teaches supply chain management at the University of Notre Dame's Mendoza College of Business. "Once the existing inventory is used up, consumers can expect to see smaller quantities of pork products in stores due to processing plant closures," Foster says.

E.1 – Voted against \$125 State Tax Refunds for Individual North Carolinians

In August 2019, Peterson Voted against HB 74, a Bill to Provide Refunds to Taxpayers up to a Maximum of \$125 for Individuals and \$250 for Married Couples – the Conservative Civitas Institute Praised HB 74 as Way to Cement "Commitment Toward Limited Government"

According to the *Carolina Journal*, Republican legislative leaders proposed HB 74 "as a means of giving taxpayers back some of the money in the unexpected budget surplus." Under the terms of HB 74, "married couples filing income taxes jointly would get up to \$250 and individual filers would get \$125."

HB 74 passed in the State Senate but languished in the State House until it was later resurrected into a new bill that included a rider to a \$7.5 million bailout for the city of Roanoke Rapids.

The 2019 session of the N.C. General Assembly began Jan. 9, both in the House and the Senate. The session ended on Halloween, which was Wednesday, Oct. 31. Lawmakers left without a budget, failing to override Gov. Roy Cooper's veto, which came in June...

Here's a look at a few items which may not have attracted big headlines over the final 48 hours of a hectic week on Jones Street:

Roanoke Rapids bailout

The N.C. House Finance Committee tacked a \$7.5 million bailout for Roanoke Rapids to a bill aiming to give taxpayers a refund.

In August, Speaker of the House Tim Moore, R-Cleveland, and Senate Leader Phil Berger, R-Rockingham, announced <u>House Bill 74, "Taxpayer Refund Act," as a means of giving taxpayers back some of the money in the unexpected budget surplus. The revenue forecast estimated around \$900 million more in tax collections than anticipated. Republican wanted to give a chunk of the money back to taxpayers. Under H.B. 74, married couples filing income taxes jointly would get up to \$250 and individual filers would get \$125.</u>

The bill passed the Senate. It's sat in the House since August.

The House Finance Committee resurrected the income tax refund bill, but with an additional rider: a bailout for Roanoke Rapids.

The new version of the bill, a proposed committee substitute to Senate Bill 105, includes a \$7.5 million grant to Roanoke Rapids to help pay off a debt incurred by a failed theatre project.

Civitas Action noted that HB 74 "would provide refunds to taxpayers up to a maximum of \$125 for individual and \$250 for a married couple." In addition, HB 74 cemented a "commitment toward limited government." Civitas Action penalized Peterson for voting against HB 74 in their 2019 legislative scorecard.

With support from Rowan County's lone state senator, the N.C. Senate passed a bill last week that would provide a refund to taxpayers.

The Taxpayer Refund Act, if made into law, would give every taxpayer in the state a refund if he payed state taxes. The refund would be capped at \$125 for individuals and \$250 for a couple.

"Tax revenues don't belong to the government; they belong to the people who earned it,"
Senate Leader Phil Berger said. "Refunding up to \$250 means a lot to a family that's living paycheck to paycheck. We collected more money than was needed, so we're giving it back."

The Senate passed <u>House Bill 74</u> on a vote of 30-16, mostly along partisan lines, last Tuesday. Sen. Carl Ford, R-33, voted in favor of it.

The initial bill would authorize the state Department of Public Instruction to carry forward funding to develop statewide school safety initiatives, including interagency collaboration. That bill was passed by the House unanimously.

The conservative Civitas Action supports passage of the bill, calling the justification "simple and straightforward."



E.2 – Voted against Raises for K-12 Teachers and Community College Educators

In October 2019, Peterson Voted against SB 354, a Bill to Raise Teacher Salaries by 3.9% – Republican State Rep. Jeffrey Elmore Praised SB 354 and Stated, "School Employees across the State Can Finally See Their Pay Unfrozen and See Pay Increases with the Holiday Season Approaching"

On October 31, 2019, Peterson voted against SB 354, a bill to raise teacher salaries by 3.9%.

According to the *Raleigh News & Observer*, SB354 would provide "raises of 3.9% for teachers and 2% for non-instructional staff." These raises were originally included in a state budget that Governor Cooper previously vetoed. SB 354 also included an additional 4.4% teacher raise in supplemental pay if the legislature successfully overrode a veto of state budget legislation.

State Rep. Linda Johnson (R- Kannapolis) praised SB 354 by stating, "The people in our state all want to increase the amount of money in education."

State Rep Jeffrey Elmore (R- North Wilkesboro) also praised SB 354 and stated, "school employees across the state can finally see their pay unfrozen and see pay increases with the holiday season approaching."

<u>HEADLINE</u>: Teacher raises approved in North Carolina legislature; Democrats say 'not good enough'

The North Carolina General Assembly on Thursday approved average raises of 3.9% for teachers and 2% for non-instructional staff — both over the next two years and both retroactive to July 1 if signed by the governor.

<u>The Senate voted 28-21 with all Democrats opposed.</u> Mark Jewell, president of the North Carolina Association of Educators, tweeted that the raises are "inadequate" and said Democrats stood with teachers.

In the House, it passed 62-46 with all but three Democrats opposed to the bill...

If Democratic Gov. Roy Cooper signs the bill — <u>Senate Bill 354</u> — <u>teachers would get the raises that were in the state budget</u> Cooper vetoed, which includes step increases for longevity. But Cooper also said the raises are too small. He offered a budget compromise in July including 8.5% average raises.

Republicans added a deal on Wednesday: If Democrats voted with them to override the governor's budget veto in the Senate, then the bill would also automatically turn the average teacher raise into 4.4% over the next two years; 4% over the next two years plus a 0.5% bonus for non-instructional support staff; 4% over the next two years for UNC System employees and 4% over the next two years for community college employees.

<u>Rep. Linda Johnson, a Kannapolis Republican</u>, said she is proud of the bill, especially the raises it included for noncertified school employees like bus drivers, teacher's assistants and cafeteria workers.

"The people in our state all want to increase the amount of money in education," Johnson said.

Rep. Jeffrey Elmore, a North Wilkesboro Republican and a teacher, said if the raises become law, teachers would see it in their paychecks in November.

"Hopefully all this can work out to where our school employees across the state can finally see their pay unfrozen and see pay increases with the holiday season approaching," Elmore said.

Governor Roy Cooper's veto of SB 354 was sustained as the Senate failed to reach the required supermajority to override. All Democrats in the North Carolina State Senate voted against the override.

HEADLINE: Senate fails to override governor veto on teacher pay raises; budget veto vote withdrawn

Senate Democrats held firm Tuesday in their opposition to Senate Republican efforts to override two vetoes by Democratic Gov. Cooper.

As a result, Senate GOP leadership withdrew a planned override vote on Cooper's veto of the Republican-sponsored state budget — likely until the next round of the 2019 legislative session, which starts April 28.

The Senate voted 28-21 in favor of overriding the veto of Senate Bill 354, which offered a 3.9% raise to public school educators.

However, Senate GOP fell two votes short of the 30 votes necessary for the override since all 21 Senate Democrats voted to sustain the veto. Sen. Tom McInnis, R-Anson, had an excused absence...

SB354, which both chambers of the General Assembly approved Oct. 31 and Cooper vetoed Nov. 8, also contained a 4.4% raise in supplement pay that was only effective if the budget veto was overridden.

The pay raises in SB354 would have been 2% in 2019-20 and 1.9% in 2020-21. The 2019-20 raise would be made retroactive to July 1.

The North Carolina General Assembly approved 3.9% pay raises for teachers and 2% raises for non-instructional staff Thursday, both increases over the next two years and retroactive to July 1.

The Senate voted 28-21 in favor of the Strengthening Educators' Pay Act, while the House passed it 62-46. Democrats in both chambers opposed the bill, saying the raises were not enough.

Similar raises were included in the state budget that Cooper, a Democrat vetoed earlier this year; he said the raises were too small. He offered a budget compromise in July that included 8.5% raises.

North Carolina Association of Educators president Mark Jewell called the raises "incomprehensible" in a statement.

"The minuscule pay increase offered in the educator pay proposal just passed by the General Assembly is an outrageous affront to the professionalism of every educator in our state, be they a teacher, an Education Support Professional, or a retiree," Jewell said in the statement. "It is incomprehensible that Republican leadership would think educators could be pressured into taking such an inadequate offer, and we stand with the governor in opposition to this legislation."

Community College salaries, and \$24.8 million in the second year."

HEADLINE: Two education-related mini-budgets move through state senate

Senate Republicans introduced Wednesday, Oct. 23, a pair of mini-budget bills that would raise pay for K-12 educators and university employees.

The move continues the GOP's strategy of introducing mini-budgets to get around Gov. Roy Cooper's budget veto. Senate leader Phil Berger, R-Rockingham, said the Senate will pass these piecemeal spending plans until Oct. 31, when the Senate will adjourn for the year. House Speaker Tim Moore, R-Cleveland, hasn't said when the House will adjourn. But he's hinted it'll be soon after the Senate leaves...

The committee also approved a PCS to House Bill 231 that would raise pay for employees of the University of North Carolina system and the N.C. Community College system.

For UNC salary increases, the mini-budget appropriates \$15 million in the first year and \$30 million the second year. A little more than \$12 million would be appropriated in the first year for N.C. Community College salaries, and \$24.8 million in the second year. The PCS to H.B. 231 includes \$17 million over two years for UNC faculty retention.

Wake Technical Community College president Scott Ralls stated that North Carolina Community Colleges were "uniquely underfunded."

Asheville-Buncombe Technical Community College has food pantries on its campuses — for its teachers.

<u>Full-time professors at North Carolina's community colleges earn less than K-12 teachers</u>. Their average pay is \$51,478 — some \$2,500 less than the average salary of K-12 teachers — and community colleges say that's not enough to hire or keep teachers.

North Carolina boasts the nation's third-largest community college system, with 58 community colleges serving 700,000 students. But the state <u>ranked just six places from rock bottom in the nation for how it pays its community college teachers</u>. Now, those employees hope to pass a 5% raise during the General Assembly's short session in late April.

Full-time teachers made an average \$43,382 at Piedmont Community College in 2019. That average pay jumps to \$57,365 at Johnston Community College — which ranked first for its salaries in 2018-19.

"It's really heartbreaking, that this is reality our facility and staff face," said Beth Stewart, A-B Tech vice president of instructional services. "Unless the state as a whole makes a commitment to doing more for the community college faculty and staff, our hands are pretty much tied."

Job positions remain open for months, sometimes years. A-B Tech buffed its job descriptions and beefed up its benefits — often to no avail. And as more teachers near retirement, Stewart worries a "silver-tsunami" will sweep away irreplaceable staff.

"The cost of living in Asheville is outrageous," Stewart said. "If we're not paying enough, it doesn't really matter. ... People have to live."

To hire a teacher, community colleges must compete with each other, private universities, businesses, and even public K-12 schools.

Things are especially bad in short-term workforce training, which community colleges credit for their first enrollment increase in almost a decade. Businesses often poach their instructors, sometimes by doubling their salaries.

"We have been struggling for years in this area," <u>said Scott Ralls, Wake Technical</u>
<u>Community College president</u>. "Just this morning, we lost a key, key position because we can't even get close to the salaries offered. ... <u>They're uniquely underfunded</u>."

According to the *Winston-Salem Journal*, SB 578 "would lower the amount of money a film production company would need to spend to receive state film and entertainment grant money." Specifically, SB 578 would "reduce expenditures from \$3 million to \$1.5 million for a feature film, as well as from \$1 million to \$500,000 for a made-for-television movie."

SB 578 also caps the maximum grant money as follows: \$7 million to feature films, \$15 million for a single season TV series, and \$250,000 for a commercial for theatrical or television viewing.

The N.C. House voted 61-49 Thursday to approve Senate Bill 578, which reduces the state's corporate tax rate and makes the state's film production industry more financially attractive.

The bill returns to the Senate, which voted 32-18 for the bill Oct. 24.

The House version removed language that would make it a binding obligation of the state to providing funding for an awarded film grant, "and is not subject to state funds being appropriated by the General Assembly." ...

SB578 takes language in the Republican state budget for the film-grants program.

Both bills would lower the amount of money a film production company would need to spend to receive state film and entertainment grant money.

The amount would reduce expenditures from \$3 million to \$1.5 million for a feature film, as well as from \$1 million to \$500,000 for a made-for-television movie.

For a television series, the requirement drops from \$1 million to \$500,000 per episode. A commercial production would remain at \$250,000.

No more than \$7 million in grants can be provided to a feature-length film, as well as no more than \$15 million for a single season of a television series, and no more than \$250,000 for a commercial for theatrical or television viewing or on-line distribution.

"I'm pleased that the minimum threshold was lowered," Rebecca Clark, executive director for the Piedmont Triad Film Commission, said in June. "Hopefully, this will enable N.C. to recruit more, smaller budget films across the entire state, including the Piedmont Triad."

Governor Roy Cooper ultimately vetoed SB 578.

In 2014, North Carolina switched from a film tax credit program to a film grant program. According to the *Los Angeles Times*, the film grant program reduced spending to only \$10 million for the first half of 2015 compared to \$61 million in annual spending for the old film tax credit program.

Even as California looks to substantially boost funding for its film tax credit, North Carolina may be exiting the Hollywood stage.

North Carolina was among the first states to offer film tax credits. The state's incentives, low labor costs and varied geography have made it a popular film location, drawing such major movies as "The Hunger Games" and the TV series "Under the Dome."

But last week state legislators opted not to renew the program, despite heavy lobbying by the local film industry to preserve the incentives.

The state budget signed by Republican Gov. Pat McCrory reserved \$10 million for a grant program for the first half of 2015.

That pales in comparison to \$61 million in tax credits received by production companies last year. Under the program, companies get back 25 cents for every dollar they spend on qualified production expenses, with a cap of \$20 million per project.

Peterson, who won the District 9 seat in November's midterm, introduced a bill Wednesday that would reenact the credit for qualifying expenses for film and television production companies. The credit, which offered 25 percent back on qualifying expenses, was allowed to expire in 2014 by the N.C. General Assembly after a lengthy battle with local film crew and advocates who fought to keep it, citing its value in luring productions to the state.

That year, \$264 million in in-state spending by productions was reported to the N.C. Department of Revenue, with the state paying out \$66 million in credits.

<u>In 2015, the state instituted a grant program that initially started out with just \$10 million in funding.</u> Through multiple revisions, that program is now allotted \$30 million annually with no sunset date.

But some within the film community continue to voice support for the tax credit, seen as the more legitimate method to landing productions when competing with states like Georgia that have reaped the benefits of a stronger incentive program for film.

Wilmington Republican Rep. Ted Davis authored an amendment to the state budget to extend the tax breaks for movie and television production companies to 2017, reducing the cap on payouts to \$15 million from \$20 million and lowering the tax break from 25 percent to 22.5 percent.

Davis said the provision would keep the state as a top-tier place to film and help the state's economy. Wilmington and Charlotte have become hubs for the industry...

But Rep. Mike Hager, a Rutherford Republican and House GOP whip, argued against the tax incentives saying the higher priority was teacher pay hikes and education. "Are we going to spend it on film tax credits or are we going to spend it on the most important thing, education?" he asked. "I want to put this money back in the classroom and pay teachers a little more."

Davis warned that if the film incentives issues doesn't make it into the House budget – it's not in the Senate proposal – that it is dead for the year. He said a separate Senate bill to make the film incentives a smaller grant program a nonstarter. "You might as well just kill the film industry," he said.

E.4 – Voted against Reducing the Franchise Tax and Personal Income Taxes

In May 2019, Peterson Voted against SB 622, a Bill to Reduce the Franchise Tax and Personal Income Taxes – SB 622 also Extended Tax Exemptions Including Fuel Tax Exemptions for Airlines

On May 20, 2019, Peterson voted against SB 622, a bill that lowered the franchise tax, reduced personal income taxes, and extended several tax exemptions.

According to the Raleigh News & Observer, SB 622 would "raise the standard deduction for personal income taxpayers by 3.75 percent" and reduce the franchise tax.

SB 622 would also extend tax emptions for fuel taxes on airlines and the sales tax for NASCAR. In addition, SB 622 would also extend "the historic preservation tax credit, a financial incentive to renovate and restore old buildings."

Lastly, "SB 622 would create an income tax deduction for the amount a business receives from the Job Maintenance and Capital Development Fund," or state job incentive grants.

HEADLINE: Your taxes could be going down again soon, and so could taxes on business

A trio of business-specific tax breaks would be extended for four more years under a tax package that has support from key lawmakers in both the state House and Senate.

Senate Bill 622 would raise the standard deduction for personal income taxpayers by 3.75 percent starting in 2021, and it would reduce franchise taxes on businesses while requiring online "marketplace facilitators," such as eBay, to collect sales taxes.

For a married couple filing jointly, the standard deduction would increase from \$20,000 to \$20,750 starting in 2021, with similar changes for other types of personal income taxpayers. That's the amount on which someone who doesn't itemize their tax returns will owe no income taxes. When fully implemented, the change would reduce state revenue by about \$88 million per year.

That's less than the amount of revenue involved in the proposed franchise tax cut for businesses, which would save businesses more than \$230 million annually starting next year. The franchise tax is based on a corporation's overall tax base in North Carolina...

SB 622 and its House companion would also <u>extend three tax exemptions</u> for specific types of businesses, currently set to expire next year. The biggest of the three is a provision that <u>exempts airlines from paying jet fuel taxes</u>, a break that saves the airline industry up to \$11 million per year...

The primary beneficiary of the tax break is American Airlines, which has a hub in Charlotte.

Also in the Charlotte area, the bill would <u>extend sales tax exemptions for NASCAR</u>, which save the industry about \$3 million per year...

A third extension in the bill is for the historic preservation tax credit, a financial incentive to renovate and restore old buildings. That would cost the state \$4.5 million in fiscal year 2020-2021, according to a legislative analysis.

The inclusion in SB 622 is notable because the Senate initially opposed an extension of the credit several years ago. But the bill doesn't go as far as some House Republicans wanted: A four-year extension of the existing credit falls short of the 10-year extension and beefed-up credit in House Bill 399, which passed the House Commerce Committee earlier this month.

Another tax break in the bill is new, giving an extra boost to companies receiving state jobs incentive grants. SB 622 would create an income tax deduction for the amount a business receives from the Job Maintenance and Capital Development Fund (JMAC), the Jobs Development Investment Grant Program (JDIG) or the One North Carolina Fund. An analysis of the bill pegs the value of the deduction at less than \$1 million per year.

The bill also increases standard deductions, cutting taxes for individual taxpayers. The standard deduction for a married couple would go from \$20,000 to \$20,750 under the bill...

Hise and Tillman are two of the three chairs on the Senate Finance committee, which writes tax policy. The third, Sen. Paul Newton, R-Cabarrus, is also a sponsor on the bill...

The bill was filed this week, just ahead of a filing deadline for Senate legislation. A House version is likely, but that chamber's deadline has not yet arrived.

Hise and Tillman said the <u>franchise tax</u>, <u>which taxes businesses not on profits but on their worth</u>, is an unfair drag on the economy.

"It's basically taxing you on the privilege of being able to work in North Carolina," Tillman said...

Republican legislative leaders have rejected that budget, and Senate President Pro Tem Phil Berger said Thursday that he'd like to lower the franchise tax, if possible. Among other things, it's a drag on the state in annual rankings on business friendliness, he said.

"I think that would be good for business in North Carolina," Berger, R-Rockingham, said.

The Republican-controlled legislature has lowered corporate and personal income tax rates in the state for the past several years.



News coverage confirmed that the state budget passed the North Carolina State Senate by a 33-15 margin and was sent to Governor Roy Cooper.

The Republican-controlled General Assembly gave final approval on Thursday to its North Carolina government budget agreement and sent it to Democratic Gov. Roy Cooper, who is likely to veto it.

The House and Senate voted for the two-year spending plan in separate votes, with the margins in favor of the plan similar to Wednesday's preliminary votes in each chamber.

While Cooper has 10 days to decide on the budget measure at his desk, the governor scheduled a Friday morning news conference at the Executive Mansion, with the budget as the topic. A Cooper veto will be upheld if Democrats largely remain united on future override votes and stick to their current levels of support in the House...

While the Senate had no further debate on Thursday before a 33-15 vote, House members kept at it, with Democrats complaining about what's present or absent from the nearly 400-page budget bill.

North Carolina Gov. Roy Cooper on Friday vetoed the Republican-drawn state budget that passed a day earlier, likely setting up tough negotiations with GOP leaders over the future of Medicaid expansion, school construction and tax cuts.

Cooper vetoed the measure a few hours after explaining his decision to do so at an Executive Mansion news conference attended by supporters. The House and Senate gave final approval to its two-year spending plan on Thursday.

"I'm vetoing this budget because it fails in many ways," Cooper said at the news conference. "This budget is an astonishing failure of common sense and common decency."

This will be the third time in as many years as governor that Cooper has vetoed what's annually the most important piece of legislation. His previous two vetoes were overridden. But he now sits in a stronger position because Democratic seat gains in the House and Senate have eroded the Republicans' once veto-proof majorities.

Republicans will attempt to override him after the July 4 weekend, but their success appears unlikely given that only a few Democrats in the House joined with the GOP in this week's votes for the actual budget. Even Democratic senators who voted for the budget this week because it contained provisions they favored were in attendance Friday to stand with Cooper.

The North Carolina legislature is done trying to override Democratic Gov. Roy Cooper's vetoes on the budget and a few other hot-button issues — until at least next year.

The N.C. Senate and House of Representatives both adjourned Thursday evening, putting a temporary end to one of the longest legislative sessions in recent years that was dominated by redistricting lawsuits and a fight over the budget and Medicaid expansion.

The House voted to override Cooper's budget veto in a controversial vote Sept. 11, when nearly every Democrat was absent. But in the Senate, <u>Democrats were able to keep Cooper's veto alive</u>. They hold 21 of the 50 seats, which is the minimum number of votes needed to stop a veto override.

"The votes were not ready to be taken so we've now moved that as well as a couple other overrides," Republican Senate leader Phil Berger said Thursday in a press conference after the session ended.

Housing Finance Agency "will lose \$20 million that it had planned to combine with federal housing funds to subsidize the construction of affordable rental developments in low-income rural counties" and "is also losing \$7.2 million it had planned to provide to developers and property owners who create housing for people with disabilities."

If a state budget is a state's road map, North Carolina has officially lost its way.

The standoff between the General Assembly's Republican majority and Democratic Gov. Roy Cooper has blocked the adoption of a new state budget and has the state retracing last year's spending plan.

It's the nature of a standoff that each side points at the other, but the blame here is far from equally shared. The Republican leaders have brought this on by continuing to push through legislation — or deny Medicaid expansion — as if the 2018 election had not eliminated their veto-proof majorities in the House and Senate. Cooper has vetoed 14 bills, including the budget. The Republican majority has failed to override any...

Meanwhile the inability of North Carolina's leaders to agree on a budget has raised doubts about the state's financial management, which could undermine its coveted AAA rating. The credit rating agency Moody's Investor Service said as the impasse deepened last November that, "The lack of a budget for more than four months reflects governance weakness and is credit negative."

The lack of a budget isn't just about the big items — raises for educators and UNC construction projects. It's also about the small losses that loom large in the lives of individuals who depend on state support.

Scott Farmer, the executive director of the N.C. Housing Finance Agency, described two changes in housing for low-income people and disabled people that will result from the lack of new funding. His agency will lose \$20 million that it had planned to combine with federal housing funds to subsidize the construction of affordable rental developments in low-income rural counties. Without the state subsidy, developers may have to build the units in more affluent counties to make their investments sound. "We will see less applications in low- and moderate-income counties," Farmer said. "The damage has been done at this point."

Meanwhile, the agency is also losing \$7.2 million it had planned to provide to developers and property owners who create housing for people with disabilities. The Department of Health and Human Services uses the new housing to move disabled people from group homes and institutions to their own apartments. Now the number of units will remain fixed and some disabled people won't get an opportunity for better and more independent living for another year.



According to CBS 3 WBTV, HB 370 would require "local sheriffs and law enforcement agencies to contact ICE or other federal immigration authorities if a person being arrested cannot provide proof of citizenship." Also, if there are any outstanding ICE warrants, HB 370 allows the local law enforcement agency to "hold the individual for up to 48 hours so that ICE can conduct an interview."

<u>HEADLINE</u>: NC Senate passes legislation requiring sheriffs, federal immigration agencies work together

House Bill 370 was passed Monday by the North Carolina Senate, pushing it forward to the state House where it will ultimately be determined if it becomes law.

The bill requires local sheriffs and law enforcement agencies to contact ICE or other federal immigration authorities if a person being arrested cannot provide proof of citizenship. If it is revealed that there are any outstanding ICE warrants for the individual, the local law enforcement agency will hold the individual for up to 48 hours so that ICE can conduct an interview.

"As the Sheriff of our state's largest county, I am disappointed that our state lawmakers have voted to approve House Bill 370. The passing of HB370 mandates that each Sheriff's Office report and detain individuals for Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and sets the priorities for public safety in direct defiance of my constituents' demands," Mecklenburg County Sheriff Garry McFadden said.

The legislation comes after Governor Cooper spoke earlier in the day, criticizing the nature of the legislation and supporting the sheriff's who have refused to comply with ICE during this time.

The Senate voted 25-18 on Monday night in support of House Bill 370, but Cooper's comments may represent a serious obstacle to the bill, which would need approval from him or from super-majorities in the legislature...

But in Monday night's Senate debate, Sen. Chuck Edwards, R-Henderson, said many opponents are "not fully understanding what this bill does."

"There is a huge cloud in America right now involving immigration," he said, citing debates over immigration raids, border detention facilities and the DACA program. "What we're talking about is cooperating with an organization (ICE) that's trying to protect us."

The North Carolina House has passed the bill, but needs to vote again to approve changes made by senators.

Sen. Harry Brown, R-Onslow, said the bill only affects immigrants who are arrested and are targeted by ICE because they've "committed crimes across the country."

"Why is that unfair?" he asked "This is a bad guy, he's committed crimes everywhere, or bad enough to be on this list."...

Rep. Destin Hall, who sponsored the effort, said in a statement that "it's sad to see the Governor has sided with radical open-borders liberals over the (association)."

"Domestic violence offenses if you look at the history, offenses against children, these sex offenses, violent assaults," Speaker Tim Moore said. "Why in the world would the sheriff release people like that and why in the world would the governor not sign a bill to say no to that?"

According to ICE, Mecklenburg County has recently denied up to 22 detainer requests.

It means immigration officials have to find these people on their own. "When ICE has to go into a community and make an arrest that is more dangerous for the ICE officer, it's more dangerous for the person being arrested and its also more dangerous as a whole," Cox said.



<u>Democratic Gov. Roy Cooper vetoed a Republican-sponsored voter-rolls bill Wednesday, his 10th veto of the N.C. General Assembly's 2019 session.</u>

Senate Bill 250 would remove from voter rolls anyone who is disqualified from jury duty because they have been determined not to be a U.S. citizen.

The latest of six versions of SB250 cleared the N.C. House on a 59-51 vote Oct. 30 in Raleigh; the N.C. Senate approved it the same day 29-21 along party lines...

The bill cleared the legislature after a compromise that removed a requirement that the State Board of Elections post online a list of individuals affected by the law and their voting-registration status.

"Only citizens should be allowed to vote," Cooper said in a statement posted on the N.C. governor's website.

"But blocking legitimate voters from casting a ballot is a risk we cannot take when the law already prevents non-citizens from voting and has legitimate mechanisms to remove them from the rolls," he wrote. "This legislation creates a high risk of voter harassment and intimidation and could discourage citizens from voting."

Cooper's veto, as expected, drew criticism from Republican legislators and praise from liberal groups.

"Governor Roy Cooper continued his radical left-wing agenda by blocking a bill titled 'Remove foreign citizens from voting rolls,' even though federal authorities recently charged 19 foreign nationals in North Carolina with voting illegally," GOP state Sens. Joyce Krawiec of Forsyth County and Warren Daniel of Burke County, said in a written statement.

Civitas Action noted that "SB 250 is an important step in maintaining the integrity of North Carolina's voter rolls" and penalized Peterson for voting against SB 250 on their 2019 legislative scorecard.

SB250, Remove Foreign Citizens from Voting Rolls, requires the clerk of superior court to report the names and addresses of anyone who is excused from jury duty due to non-citizenship, non-residency, or current felony sentence to the State Board of Elections. The State Board and county boards would then start the process of verifying the information and potentially removing ineligible voters from the voter roll through the normal process of list maintenance after a 30-days written notice and an opportunity to appeal. SB 250 is an important step in maintaining the integrity of North Carolina's voter rolls. The vote to preserve freedom is yes.

F.3 – Served as a "Character Reference" for Illegal Immigrant Caught with a Gun in 2002

In 2002, Peterson Wrote a Letter "as a Character Reference" in Support of Alejandro Llinas-Suarez – Llinas-Suarez Was Arrested by Federal Authorities for Overstaying a Six-Month Visitor's Visa Granted in 1993 and for Unlawfully Possessing a Gun as an Illegal Alien

In 2002, Peterson wrote a letter "as a character reference" in support of Alejandro Llinas-Suarez and said that he had "come to appreciate Mr. Llinas' work that affects our community." "Llinas-Suarez was arrested by federal authorities in October 2002 for overstaying a six-month visitor's visa granted to him in 1993 and for unlawfully possessing a gun as an illegal alien.

Within days of holding a festival to help Hispanic aliens obtain work visas, Spanish-language newspaper publisher Alejandro Llinas was jailed, apparently for not having a valid visa himself.

Wilmington Mayor Harper Peterson and City Councilman Jason Thompson on Monday wrote nearly identical letters to the INS in Atlanta expressing their support for Mr. Llinas

Mr. Thompson said Mr. Llinas is a "tireless advocate" for Hispanics, housing, economic empowerment and community development. Mr. Peterson said he has "come to appreciate Mr. Llinas' work that affects our community." ...

Mr. Peterson said Tuesday he wrote the letter at the request of some in the Hispanic community who want to see Mr. Llinas released pending his deportation hearing.

"They want to settle his business affairs," Mr. Peterson said, adding that he wasn't asking for Mr. Llinas' release, but providing a character reference.



HEADLINE: NC House falls 5 votes short in effort to override veto of abortion-related bill

The NC House of Representatives fell five votes short of a required 60 percent majority in a Republican-led effort Wednesday to override Democratic Gov. Roy Cooper's veto of <u>SB 359</u>, an abortion-related proposal.

The final House vote was 67-53. With all 120 members voting, the override would have required 72 votes to pass.

The bill, the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act, would have criminalized doctors who do not provide medical care to babies accidentally born alive during botched abortions.

In a year when legislatures around the country have passed a wave of controversial abortionrelated legislation, the North Carolina bill drew substantial news media attention and heated rhetoric on social media, including from some members of the General Assembly.

Bill supporters said it was about protecting babies. Opponents said it applied to extremely rare situations in which existing laws already protect children. Democrats accused Republicans of using the measure to intimidate medical professionals who provide abortions.

Civitas Action noted that SB 359 "legally reaffirms that a baby that survives an attempted abortion has the rights of a human being and is entitled to any life-saving medical care available" and penalized Peterson for voting against SB 359 on their 2019 legislative scorecard.



HEADLINE: After HB2, NC leaders remain divided about LGBTQ protections in the state

More than two years after a law limiting local protections for gay rights in North Carolina was enacted, leaders remain sharply split over whether House Bill 2 was needed and what protections should be afforded to LGBTQ people.

A narrow majority of NC Influencers surveyed said municipalities in the state should be able to extend nondiscrimination protections to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people if they want, an option that's currently blocked under state law. But it's clear that the legacy of House Bill 2, which became known as the "bathroom bill," remains deeply divisive.

Some Republican respondents said HB2 was a common-sense measure to correct overreach by Charlotte's government. A majority of survey respondents, including all Democrats, said it was an unnecessary piece of legislation that furthered discrimination...

The state legislature passed HB2 in 2016 to counteract a Charlotte ordinance protecting LGBTQ people from discrimination and allowing transgender people to use public restrooms that matched their gender identity. Opponents said the Charlotte ordinance would make it legal for criminals to follow women and children into bathrooms.

HB2 preempted local protections for LGBTQ people and forbade local nondiscrimination ordinances. It also blocked cities from setting their own minimum wage laws. Backlash to the bill was swift: Businesses criticized North Carolina, the NBA moved the All-Star Game out of Charlotte, the NCAA ruled the state couldn't host future tournaments and PayPal canceled a 400-job expansion announced for Charlotte, among other moves...

Mark Jewell, president of the North Carolina Association of Educators, agreed.

"While we each have the right to our own religious beliefs those freedoms don't give anyone the right to discriminate against or harm other people," he said. "When businesses open their doors to the public, they must open them to everyone on the same terms.

Discriminatory business practices hurt the economy overall by limiting people's spending power."

The 2019 session of the N.C. General Assembly began Jan. 9, both in the House and the Senate. The session ended on Halloween, which was Wednesday, Oct. 31. Lawmakers left without a budget, failing to override Gov. Roy Cooper's veto, which came in June...

Here's a look at a few items which may not have attracted big headlines over the final 48 hours of a hectic week on Jones Street: ...

Innovative School District

The House and Senate made several changes to the Innovative School District program and delayed the number of schools that must be added to the ISD.

Despite objections from Democratic lawmakers, Senate Bill 522 passed 33-16 in the Senate and 64-48 in the House. ISD — originally called the Achievement School District — became law in 2016. The program places the lowest-performing schools in the state under management of charter or education organizations for five years. The goal is to improve school performance through awarding greater flexibility not typically afforded traditional public schools.

Only one school, Southside Ashpole in Robeson County, has been transferred to the ISD. Carver Heights in Wayne County was poised to join the program in 2018, but significant local pushback and criticism over the selection process halted the transfer. Instead, the General Assembly passed legislation allowing Carver Heights to become a Restart School and stay under local control instead of joining the ISD.

Now some lawmakers hope to reform the program, providing more clarity to the selection process and avoiding a repeat of last year's drama.

According to the *Laurinburg Exchange*, SB 609 "amends school-choice scholarships, aiming to make them more available to North Carolina students." According to SB 609, "4-year-olds would be eligible for the Special Education Scholarships for Children with Disabilities, the Opportunity Scholarship program, and Personal Education Savings accounts."

SB 609 also removed a cap on scholarship funds for students entering kindergarten or first grade which had previously caused waitlist issues. In addition, SB 609 increased the household income limit from "from 133% of the amount required to qualify for the federal free or reduced price lunch — to 150%."

The Laurinburg Exchange reported that Republicans legislators praised SB 609 which would "expand educational opportunities for more families across the state."

HEADLINE: State Senate passes two school-choice bills after spirited debate

The N.C. Senate on Wednesday, May 8, sparred over a pair of school choice bills that would expand eligibility for private school vouchers and lift the enrollment cap on virtual charter schools.

Democratic lawmakers argued the two bills devalue public education and harm students. Republican lawmakers said the bills expand educational opportunities for more families across the state...

Senate Bill 609 amends school-choice scholarships, aiming to make them more available to North Carolina students. Under the bill, 4-year-olds would be eligible for the Special Education Scholarships for Children with Disabilities, the Opportunity Scholarship program, and Personal Education Savings accounts.

S.B. 609 raises the household income limit for eligibility to the Opportunity Scholarship program — from 133% of the amount required to qualify for the federal free or reduced price lunch — to 150%. The bill eliminates a cap on scholarship funds for students entering kindergarten or first grade.

"The Opportunity Scholarship Program is a lifeline for low-income children who otherwise would attend unsatisfactory district schools," said Terry Stoops, vice president of research and director of education studies at the John Locke Foundation. "The cap on kindergarten and first-grade students led to unacceptable wait-lists. I am pleased that this bill discards that cap."...

Sen. Deanna Ballard, R-Watauga, one of the bill's sponsors, pointed to an N.C. State report that shows the annual median income of households applying for the Opportunity Scholarship program was just more than \$16,000.

"We are just trying to allow more of those working families who live on that uncomfortable income level the opportunity to assess and determine the best school options for their students needs," Ballard said. "I'm not in a position to assume what that best need is, and I think as politicians we should leave that decision to the parents."

Ballard said the bill addresses concerns from parents over accessibility by expanding eligibility and by lifting the cap on students entering kindergarten and first grade.

S.B. 609 passed the Senate, 27-18 vote, and goes to the House.



A spokeswoman for Republican Senate Leader Phil Berger criticized Governor Roy Cooper's veto stating "It's disappointing that Governor Cooper continues to fight against empowering parents to put their children in an educational setting that best fits their needs."

Gov. Roy Cooper has vetoed a bill that would allow the state's popular but low-performing virtual charter schools to add students, after two left-leaning groups urged him to reject the legislation.

State lawmakers passed a bill in July <u>lifting the enrollment cap on the state's two virtual charter schools so that they could grow by 20% a year</u>. Cooper announced Monday that he had rejected <u>Senate Bill 392</u>, citing the schools' poor academic performance.

"Current law already allows the State Board of Education to lift the enrollment cap on virtual charter schools," Cooper, a Democrat, said in a statement. "Both schools have been low performing, raising concern about the effectiveness of this pilot. Decisions on adding more students should remain with the Board so it can measure progress and make decisions that will provide the best education for students."...

Republicans lawmakers accused Cooper of not supporting school choice with the veto.

"Expanding these education opportunities for students enjoyed broad bipartisan support in the state House to help kids learn in a setting that works best for them," House Speaker Tim Moore tweeted Monday. "The Governor is now blocking innovative learning as well as school construction and pay raises."

<u>Bill D'Elia, a spokesman for Senate leader Phil Berger</u>, noted how 1 in 5 North Carolina students don't attend traditional public schools.

"It's disappointing that Governor Cooper continues to fight against empowering parents to put their children in an educational setting that best fits their needs," D'Elia said in a statement. "As recent enrollment numbers show, more parents than ever are taking control of their child's education, as parents, not politicians, should be the ones making these decisions."

"Guns are too readily available," said Bob Spitzen. He favors gun control, but said he would have determine what would be best for the community and what the mayor's limitations would be in regulating guns.

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Government described the bill as allowed for a temporary restriction of gun access to individuals who were deemed a danger to themselves or others if they possessed a firearm.

Enacts new GS Chapter 50E, the Extreme Risk Protection Orders Act, providing a court procedure for concerned citizens and law enforcement to obtain an order temporarily restricting a person's access to firearms in situations where a person poses a significant danger of harming themselves or others by possessing a firearm.

HEADLINE: Leaders of NC legislature stand by law that protects Confederate monuments

House Democrats have filed a bill to repeal a 2015 law that restricts the removal of Confederate and other monuments on public property, but legislative leaders are indicating they're reluctant to revisit the controversial issue.

House Bill 10 was filed Wednesday by Democratic Reps. Pricey Harrison of Greensboro, Evelyn Terry of Winston-Salem, Marcia Morey of Durham, and Kelly Alexander of Charlotte. It would repeal the provisions in a 2015 law that bans state agencies and local governments from taking down any "object of remembrance" on public property that "commemorates an event, a person, or military service that is part of North Carolina's history." That effectively means legislation must be passed in order to remove or relocate Confederate monuments.

Asked about the bill Wednesday, House Speaker Tim Moore said he sees no need to change the law now...

UNC-Chapel Hill leaders have said the law limits their options in deciding the future of the Silent Sam statue that was torn down by protesters. A working group from the UNC Board of Governors is currently developing a plan for the statue, but the legislature has the power to intervene if it chooses to.

APPENDIX D: 2018 Candidate Interview

In 2018, as a candidate for state senate, Peterson was interviewed by the *Wilmington Port City Daily*. The complete text of the article with the interview is included below.

<u>HEADLINE:</u> Election 2018: Harper Peterson running for election in Senate District 9

Harper Peterson, former Wilmington City Council member and mayor, is running for North Carolina State Senate District 9, serving New Hanover County.

Peterson served as a city council member in the 1990s and one term as mayor, from 2001-2005.

Peterson is running against Republican Michael Lee, the two-term incumbent, and Libertarian candidate Ethan Bickley.

Below are Peterson's answers to Port City Daily's questions:

How has your previous career or record as an elected official experience shaped your view of state politics and what you'd like to accomplish in Raleigh?

As a small business owner, I understand the importance of surrounding oneself with talented, energetic, and passionate people. The same holds true in government. As a City Council Member and Mayor of Wilmington any success and credit we would claim was always shared with the individuals, typically staff, that made it happen. In addition, when serving locally, party affiliation took a back seat. Issues mattered foremost and finding solutions to community challenges, sometimes through consensus, sometimes compromise was our main focus.

At the state level, I would carry my party's values and perspectives, but listen to and work with opposition parties to find common ground and work to serve the community first. Civility and collegiality over partisan politics and acrimony

What can the General Assembly do better to help Wilmington New Hanover County? What state legislation do you personally think will benefit the region?

First, we need a senator from New Hanover County that represents the values and interests of our citizens in Raleigh. Senator Lee answers first to his party bosses in Raleigh, not us. He has voted 99.9% of the time along party lines: 534 out 535 votes taken in the last two legislative sessions. While this benefits his political career, it does not benefit the people of New Hanover County.

Specifically, we saw the interests of our community for clean water ignored when Senator Lee's "Clean Water Act" was given to Raleigh lobbyists, including Chemours, to rewrite this legislation to protect their interests before ours. Shameful. New Hanover County deserves better than that. I will put the interests of our residents back on the agenda in Raleigh.

GenX Legislation I Would Propose:

- -Appropriate the necessary funding for DEQ [Department of Environmental Quality] and DHHS [Department of Health and Human Services] to be fully operational to perform their responsibilities. This includes the necessary staffing for research, permitting, monitoring, enforcement that has been systematically defunded by this legislature over the past 8 years.
- -Appropriate funding for state-of-the-art scientific equipment, including the "high mass spectrometer" that was substituted in SB 724 for a less desirable and comprehensive model.
- -Require all industries to fully disclose, in their environmental permits all chemicals and compounds discharged into the air or water
- -Empower DEQ to immediately suspend the discharge permits of industries that allow unregulated toxic pollutants to enter the air or water.
- -Establish conditions whereby the Governor and DEQ Secretary can "declare an emergency" where the discharge of contaminants can be effectively reduced or discontinued if the public health and safety are in imminent danger.
- -Require companies guilty of illegal discharges to provide immediate and long-term treatment solutions and pay related costs. Example: CFPUA has already spent \$2 million in costs responding to the GenX crisis and is proposing a \$46 million filtration upgrade that customers will pay for, not Chemours. The public should not bear the cost.
- -Require discharge violators to pay all expenses related to the cleanup costs.
- -Require discharge violators to be responsible for a "health monitoring program" for residents who could suffer health impacts from exposure.
- -Repeal "The Hardison Amendment" which prohibits state legislators or agencies from passing stricter standards than those established by the EPA.

It's a tense political atmosphere in Raleigh. What's one specific bi-partisan issue you feel you could and would work on?

I would hope we could work on the GenX safe drinking water crisis. People expect and deserve safe air to breathe and clean water to drink. It shouldn't be political but it is. Quality education for every child is a constitutional promise and shouldn't be a political issue. But it is. The defunding of our public school system in favor of charter schools and vouchers is crippling our system. The only issue right now that both parties seem to agree on is that we need an independent non-politicized approach to drawing our new voting districts in 2020. We will see if both parties can keep their word.

Do you feel like water-quality issues in the region have been handled acceptably so far? If not, what steps would you take?

Definitely not. When the GenX crisis was exposed on June 8th of 2017, my opponent was not seen or heard for seven weeks. Leadership? When Governor Cooper asked for \$2.6 million in emergency funding in July 2017 for the agencies that were in place to address the crisis, DEQ and DHHS, Senator Lee first supported the Governor's request but then, a few weeks later, after receiving direction from Raleigh party bosses, opposed the governor. Instead, he diverted considerably less funding to local agencies (UNCW and our water authority, CFPUA) to "study" the crisis.

Not until May of 2018, eleven months later, did he get serious by introducing legislation to address the lingering problem surrounding GenX. But before it was brought for a legislative vote, he shared it with private industry for their changes and approval. They got what they wanted.

Of the thousands of emerging contaminants in our river and drinking water, this bill is limited to only a few in the GenX family. To Lee and industry, ignorance is not only bliss, it's essential!

What role, if any, do you see for the state in beach renourishment?

I believe a partnership and long-term commitment between local, state and federal agencies to fund beach renourishment program is essential. Climate change and sea level rise must be accepted as a reality, and not suppressed, as it is now by the legislature. Climate science must be a part of our policy, planning and funding priorities. Not only is our coastal environment at great risk but also our coastal economies.

I've been a small business owner in the tourism and hospitality industry for many years and I understand how important it is that we protect the natural resources that bring visitors to our communities and support the local businesses in the area. When elected, I will fight tirelessly to secure funding to maintain our beaches.

What's your opinion on the rail-realignment project in Wilmington and the surrounding areas? Is state-level investment warranted?

I support the realignment of the Wilmington rail lines. Again, a commitment of local, state, federal dollars along with private industry's participation is essential.

North Carolina's General Assembly banned Medicaid expansion in 2013. Do you think that was a good idea? Why or why not?

The decision not to accept Medicaid expansion in NC was purely political. These politicians all ran against the Affordable Care Act and so now they cannot accept the federal government's offer to expand, as 33 other states have done. We have 500,000 North Carolinians without healthcare as a result, thousands of our friends and neighbors dying each year simply because they do not have access to affordable healthcare. It is hurting our fight against the opioid crisis by not having essential dollars for prevention and treatment. Rural areas throughout the state are the most severely impacted. Rural hospitals have had to close and economies have suffered and jobs opportunities lost. It's federal dollars and again is simply political stubbornness.

Do you think the shift to the current grant system hurt the local film industry? What can Raleigh do to help reinvigorate Wilmington's film scene?

The grant program has absolutely killed the film industry in NC, an \$8 billion industry we created in NC over three and a half decades.

The first thing the Legislature should do is bring back the film industry by a simple stroke of the Governor's pen: Scrap the grant program and reestablish the film incentive/rebate program that made us the Hollywood of the East.

Senator Lee went to Raleigh in 2014 and film went to Atlanta. In 2014 there were 40 productions driving a \$280 million industry employing over 18,000 skilled workers. Today we have 3 productions and a grant program that is a pitiful substitute. Last year Georgia generated \$2.6 billion in film revenues.

My opponent and his friends in the General Assembly gave the industry away on a silver platter and Georgia has been eating our lunch ever since. We can bring film back home to North Carolina, and with it, our hardworking crew, but we cannot do that with the current legislature, as they are the very ones that gave it away to begin with.

Is school safety a state issue? If so, what state-level measures would help address the risk of school shootings?

Yes. Great attention has been given to security and safety inside our schools, as should be. But we cannot begin to address this issue unless we undertake comprehensive gun reform and legislation to address this problem outside our school walls. Common sense gun control is supported by nearly 90% of Americans. There are things that we can do to protect our children, while still respecting the rights of gun owners. Big lobbyists need to step aside and let the voice of a majority of North Carolinians be heard. In the General Assembly, I will not be beholden to gun lobbyists and will be able to work on comprehensive legislation to keep our kids safe.

Is education adequately funded at the state level? Are their changes you'd make to the way funding is currently delivered to schools?

Less than a generation ago NC was a national leader in public education. Now we are a national embarrassment, at the bottom of the barrel. We have some of the greatest universities and community colleges in the country. Why not the same for our public education system. The legislative actions I would promote are:

- 1. Funding for all three- and four-year-old children to have a PreK education.
- 2. Raise student spending to the national average. Presently 37th in the country. To compete in 21st-century economies, we need 21st-century classrooms.
- 3. Raise teacher salaries to the national average. National teacher pay is at \$60,000 or more, annually. NC is [around] \$51,000. At the very least we need to reach this national average within 5 years. Teachers are the most important professionals in our community. Pay them accordingly. Budget surplus in 2017 was \$650 million. Spend it on public education.

Is North Carolina economically competitive enough? If not, what can Raleigh do to change that?

I think the biggest opportunity is putting our future investment in renewable, clean energy sources. Solar and wind energies are reliable, efficient and unlimited and they have worked well in many other states. Solar is now our nation's second largest job creator. Fossil fuels are finite and dirty: carbon and methane emissions are a major contributor to global warming and sea level rise.

Raleigh can aggressively promote these new energy sources through incentives to private industry and governments, to develop and adopt, and not delay or obstruct as is now the state policy.
