DOSSIER NOTES

In preparing this background report, we undertook an examination of all readily available and relevant electronic and online records, several hundred Nexis and news articles, dozens of active and archived web pages, and several dozen public records from Nexis and the resources of various federal, state, and municipal government offices. The results of our analysis are contained below.

MAIN VULNERABILITIES

Personal And Political Foibles

Val Applewhite boasts numerous personal vulnerabilities which others may seek to capitalize on.

Applewhite has a history of financial mismanagement. On at least one occasion Applewhite has been tax delinquent, having been issued a Maryland state tax lien of more than \$2,000, which she satisfied several years later. To that effect, at least one small claims complaint has been filed against Applewhite with the complainant demanding nearly \$5,000. The plaintiff received default judgment shortly thereafter, which Applewhite later satisfied. Applewhite is additionally twice divorced. Applewhite petitioned for her first divorce in 1989 and it was granted in 1990. Applewhite's second divorce appears to have occurred around 2017 based on real estate records. It should also be noted that Applewhite's ex-husband, who she does not appear to have been married to at the time, was arrested three times for failing to make child support payments to his first wife between 1998 and 2000.

Throughout her tenure in public life, Applewhite has undoubtedly accumulated several political missteps and ethics concerns.

Perhaps most concerning, Applewhite flip-flopped on the creating a local ethics commission. In September 2008, Applewhite was among four Fayetteville councilmembers to vote against proceeding with an ethics commission to investigate the so-called 'Ticketgate' scandal involving a friend of Mayor Tony Chavonne. However, by November 2008, the Fayetteville Observer described Applewhite as having "only recently embraced the concept of an ethics commission".

Applewhite appears to have opposed measures to increase transparency. Specifically, in 2010, Applewhite was the only Fayetteville councilmember to vote against keeping all budget meetings open to the public.

Shockingly, Applewhite allegedly made a sexist comment while working in the census office, according to an EEOC complaint mentioning her.

Politically, Applewhite's campaigns have been linked to campaign finance complaints. In 2007, a Fayetteville man filed a campaign finance complaint alleging that corporate phones belonging to Reed Lallier Chevrolet were used for a phone bank to support Applewhite's Fayetteville city council campaign. In 2013, Cumberland County Republican Party Chairwoman, Linda Devore, filed a complaint with the County Board of Election "alleging that voters are illegally being given food and limousine rides to the polls to vote for Fayetteville Mayoral candidate Val Applewhite".

Additionally, Applewhite has been known to have a divisive disposition as a City Councilmember and once sought to restrict bringing up more than one policy proposal per Councilmember. In 2013, Fayetteville Observer editor, Tim White, criticized Applewhite for walking out of meetings amid disagreements as "destructive".

Applewhite has supported and been associated with prominent Democrats and liberal organizations, such as Jill Biden, Barack Obama, Beau Biden, Roy Cooper, Democracy North Carolina, and Advance North Carolina. On social media, Applewhite has promoted partisan content unbecoming of public official.

Fiscal Irresponsibility And Poor Governance

A review of Applewhite's municipal tenure and political activity has revealed a lengthy record of fiscal irresponsibility and poor governance.

Applewhite has broadly supported potential tax increases at the federal and municipal level. In 2012, Applewhite was among the signatories of a letter urging the North Carolina Congressional delegation to "stand with President Obama... and other voices of reason in both parties in acknowledging that new revenues must be part of a lasting solution to our debt problems." As member of the Fayetteville City Council, Applewhite opposed lowering property taxes in Fayetteville and called for property tax increases for Fayetteville residents. Additionally, Applewhite appears to have supported an effort to increase the local sales tax. Specifically, in 2008, Applewhite voted to approve a resolution "in support of the sales tax increase" which was to be voted on in an upcoming election.

Moreover, Applewhite sought to raise revenues through increasing fees and fares. Applewhite repeatedly flip-flopped on whether she would back hiking bus fares, including rates for the elderly and disabled. Further, Applewhite supported increasing the "tax on car rental companies". In several instances, Applewhite voted to increase additional local fees and fares faced by the citizens and businesses of Fayetteville. Notably, in 2008, Applewhite was among the Fayetteville City Councilmembers to unanimously adopt a fee and implement a curbside recycling program for city residents.

Unsurprisingly, during Applewhite's tenure with the Fayetteville City Council, the size of the city government steadily ballooned. In order to maintain the runaway spending, Applewhite backed various controversial budgets – that included tax and fee increases.

Applewhite's big government posture went beyond appropriations. Applewhite supported antibusiness development policies regarding zoning, parking, and tourism. Applewhite also voted in favor of using condemnation powers.

Despite his liberal leanings, Applewhite has opposed bonds to improve Fayetteville's parks and recreation system.

Applewhite's anti-business agenda has earned her the support of unions.

Far-Left Progressive Agenda

An analysis of Applewhite's public commentary and municipal governance has unearthed her support for the far-left's progressive and social agenda.

Applewhite has signaled she will rubberstamp Gov. Cooper's agenda as a legislator. Applewhite has stated that she supports Cooper's proposal to ramp up spending on education.

On healthcare, Applewhite appears to support the expansion of the government's involvement. Specifically, Applewhite strongly supports Medicaid expansion. As the southeastern organizer for Democracy North Carolina, Applewhite indicated her support for the NAACP's efforts to fight for Medicaid expansion.

On issues of public safety, Applewhite may have several vulnerabilities. Applewhite's previous political opponents have highlighted that crime "increased every year while Applewhite was on the [Fayetteville] council". Additionally, in 2020, Applewhite declined to appear with former Mayor Michael Bloomberg over his previous support for common-sense crime prevention policies.

Curiously, in 2012, Applewhite voted against a resolution declaring Dimona, Israel to be the 'Sister City' of Fayetteville.

Finally, Applewhite is fairly left-leaning on social issues. It should be noted that Applewhite is a supporter of Black Lives Matter and opposed a civil war history museum in Fayetteville. Recently, Applewhite assumedly reaffirmed her support for abortion.

 - In 2009, Applewhite was one of only two Fayetteville councilmembers to vote against lowering the city tax rate from 53 cents to 45.1 cents.
 - In 2013, Applewhite noted she would support a 1-cent property tax increase if put towards public safety.
- Applewhite opposed lowering property taxes in Fayetteville and has called for property tax increases for Fayetteville residents.
- Applewhite appears to have supported an effort to increase the local sales tax.
- Applewhite repeatedly flip-flopped on whether she would back hiking bus fares, including rates for the elderly and disabled.
- Applewhite supported increasing the "tax on car rental companies".
- Applewhite voted to increase additional local fees and fares faced by the citizens and businesses of Fayetteville.
 - In 2008, Applewhite was among the Fayetteville councilmembers to unanimously adopt a \$42 fee and implement a curbside recycling program for city residents.
 - In 2010, Applewhite voted in favor of a "proposed registry fee" that "would have been \$15 per unit and vary based on size for apartment complexes".

- In 2011, Applewhite noted her support for the 2011 2012 budget, which represented a 3.3 percent spending increase and also increased some fees in planning, zoning, and engineering.
- During Applewhite's tenure with the Fayetteville City Council, the size of city government steadily ballooned.
- Applewhite supported anti-business development policies regarding zoning, parking, and tourism.
- Applewhite voted in favor of using condemnation powers.
- Applewhite has opposed bonds to improve Fayetteville's Parks and Recreation system.
- Applewhite opposed allowing the keeping of potbellied pigs as pets in city limits.
- Applewhite has been backed by unions.
- Applewhite supports Cooper's increased spending on education.
- Applewhite strongly supports Medicaid expansion.

APPLEWHITE'S PERSONAL AND POLITICAL FOIBLES

Val Applewhite boasts numerous personal vulnerabilities which others may seek to capitalize on.

Applewhite has a history of financial mismanagement. On at least one occasion Applewhite has been tax delinquent, having been issued a Maryland state tax lien of more than \$2,000, which she satisfied several years later. To that effect, at least one small claims complaint has been filed against Applewhite with the complainant demanding nearly \$5,000. The plaintiff received default judgment shortly thereafter, which Applewhite later satisfied. Applewhite is additionally twice divorced. Applewhite petitioned for her first divorce in 1989 and it was granted in 1990. Applewhite's second divorce appears to have occurred around 2017 based on real estate records. It should also be noted that Applewhite's ex-husband, who she does not appear to have been married to at the time, was arrested three times for failing to make child support payments to his first wife between 1998 and 2000.

Throughout her tenure in public life, Applewhite has undoubtedly accumulated several political missteps and ethics concerns.

Perhaps most concerning, Applewhite flip-flopped on the creating a local ethics commission. In September 2008, Applewhite was among four Fayetteville councilmembers to vote against proceeding with an ethics commission to investigate the so-called 'Ticketgate' scandal involving a friend of Mayor Tony Chavonne. However, by November 2008, the Fayetteville Observer described Applewhite as having "only recently embraced the concept of an ethics commission".

Applewhite appears to have opposed measures to increase transparency. Specifically, in 2010, Applewhite was the only Fayetteville councilmember to vote against keeping all budget meetings open to the public.

Shockingly, Applewhite allegedly made a sexist comment while working in the census office, according to an EEOC complaint mentioning her.

Politically, Applewhite's campaigns have been linked to campaign finance complaints. In 2007, a Fayetteville man filed a campaign finance complaint alleging that corporate phones belonging to Reed Lallier Chevrolet were used for a phone bank to support Applewhite's Fayetteville city council campaign. In 2013, Cumberland County Republican Party Chairwoman, Linda Devore, filed a complaint with the County Board of Election "alleging that voters are illegally being given food and limousine rides to the polls to vote for Fayetteville Mayoral candidate Val Applewhite".

Additionally, Applewhite has been known to have a divisive disposition as a City Councilmember and once sought to restrict bringing up more than one policy proposal per Councilmember. In 2013, Fayetteville Observer editor, Tim White, criticized Applewhite for walking out of meetings amid disagreements as "destructive".

Applewhite has supported and been associated with prominent Democrats and liberal organizations, such as Jill Biden, Barack Obama, Beau Biden, Roy Cooper, Democracy North

Carolina, and Advance North Carolina. On social media, Applewhite has promoted partisan content unbecoming of public official.

'Fayetteville City Council members have clarified how they voted Tuesday for a planned ethics commission to investigate Ticketgate. The 6-4 vote was unclear after the meeting, but The Fayetteville Observer clarified the count by interviewing council members this week and reviewing city clerk Candice White's notes. It was clear after the vote that the motion passed, but Mayor Tony Chavonne said his tally wasn't certain. The ethics panel issue arose after a friend of Mayor Tony Chavonne's was involved in a three-car wreck Oct. 25. Her traffic citation was voided. Tuesday, Councilman D.J. Haire made a motion to proceed with the formation of the ethics commission, which is expected to be ready by early next year. The motion also asked the panel to investigate the conduct of top officials, including the mayor, who became involved after the wreck. 

APPLEWHITE'S FISCAL IRRESPONSIBILITY AND POOR GOVERNANCE

A review of Applewhite's municipal tenure and political activity has revealed a lengthy record of fiscal irresponsibility and poor governance.

Applewhite has broadly supported potential tax increases at the federal and municipal level. In 2012, Applewhite was among the signatories of a letter urging the North Carolina Congressional delegation to "stand with President Obama... and other voices of reason in both parties in acknowledging that new revenues must be part of a lasting solution to our debt problems." As member of the Fayetteville City Council, Applewhite opposed lowering property taxes in Fayetteville and called for property tax increases for Fayetteville residents. Additionally, Applewhite appears to have supported an effort to increase the local sales tax. Specifically, in 2008, Applewhite voted to approve a resolution "in support of the sales tax increase" which was to be voted on in an upcoming election.

Moreover, Applewhite sought to raise revenues through increasing fees and fares. Applewhite repeatedly flip-flopped on whether she would back hiking bus fares, including rates for the elderly and disabled. Further, Applewhite supported increasing the "tax on car rental companies". In several instances, Applewhite voted to increase additional local fees and fares faced by the citizens and businesses of Fayetteville. Notably, in 2008, Applewhite was among the Fayetteville City Councilmembers to unanimously adopt a fee and implement a curbside recycling program for city residents.

Unsurprisingly, during Applewhite's tenure with the Fayetteville City Council, the size of the city government steadily ballooned. In order to maintain the runaway spending, Applewhite backed various controversial budgets – that included tax and fee increases.

Applewhite's big government posture went beyond appropriations. Applewhite supported antibusiness development policies regarding zoning, parking, and tourism. Applewhite also voted in favor of using condemnation powers.

Despite his liberal leanings, Applewhite has opposed bonds to improve Fayetteville's parks and recreation system.

Applewhite's anti-business agenda has earned her the support of unions.

"What we need is more protection and security," said Ella McRae, 68, stepping into the post office on Cliffdale Road. "And at the rate we are growing, we definitely need more officers." James Popp, coordinator of the Kornbow community watch off Blanton Road, said the only property tax increase he would support is for police. "Homeowners have more of a stake in peaceful neighborhoods and city, and the police try to provide that," Popp said. A 1-cent tax increase on a \$100,000 home would cost \$10 more annually. For a \$250,000 home, the cost would be \$25. Christine Legette, who stopped at the Cliffdale Branch Library on Thursday, said she wouldn't mind paying about \$15 more on her annual tax bill for extra police on the streets. "What's \$15 for your safety?" she asked. Brooks, owner of Trimmerz, already pays nearly \$1,700 for property tax annually. "Monday's sobering news arrived to the council as an unpleasant event everyone knew eventually had to happen. It was like a scolding from your parents. "But sometimes bitter pills are what gets the job done." However, In June 2010, Applewhite Voted For The Final Version Of The 2010-2011 Budget Which Included No Increases With Bus Fares. "The Fayetteville City Council adopted a new budget Monday amid controversy and the threat of a lawsuit. The council voted 7-3 to pass a fiscal 2011 budget that neither raises bus fares nor increases property taxes. Councilman Bill Crisp left the Council Chambers upset following the vote before the meeting ended, threatening to sue the city over the adoption of the \$173.9 million budget. Crisp said he was denied the opportunity to make a motion Monday night that sought to strip \$50,000 from the new budget for another police study that he thought was unnecessary. "Something is not right here," Crisp said in a terse and elevated voice from his seat at the dais. "I find these proceedings entirely irregular." Crisp said Councilwoman Kady-Ann Davy also was denied the chance to attempt to restore the proposed cuts to nonprofit agencies by taking about \$77,000 from city reserves. "I think I had pretty good support," Davy said after the meeting. Like Crisp, Davy had hoped to make a motion that would have amended the budget proposal for the fiscal year that starts Thursday. "I don't think it was fair," she said. Instead, the budget passed with a 25 percent reduction in nonprofit spending and \$50,000 for a police study to expand service to the western annexed areas of the city. The program will be voluntary, and officials estimate that at least 50 percent of families will participate in the first year. The program will exclude apartments and businesses. Some fees, particularly in planning, zoning and engineering, would increase. According to the new budget, households will get six free bulky-item trash pickups a year; subsequent pickups would be \$50 each. There is no charge for excess collections now. Eligible employees would get 2.5 percent pay raises, and most police officers would see raises of between 4 percent and 5 percent. "I'm glad we were able to give them raises," Councilman Robert Massey said Friday. City employees received no raises in 2009 and 2 percent raises last year. Police received raises of between 4 percent and 5 percent in each of the past two years. Officials said they needed to raise police pay to recruit and retain officers and to reduce vacancies in the department. Mayor Tony Chavonne said he expects the budget to pass. He is not aware of any unresolved issues with it, he said. MuniServices LLC was employed to find businesses that owed annual fees for what's called a privilege license. The company found that under city ordinances, the fee was due from rental property owners and people who sell cosmetics and other catalogue items from home. Not even city staff were aware of that provision. When the auditor set about billing those businesses, the complaints started. The council voted to exempt catalogue sales from the fee and to return any back fees collected from rental property owners over the past three years. The measure passed 6-4, with Keith Bates, Val Applewhite, Ted Mohn and D.J. Haire voting no. Trudy Matthews, a Mary Kay cosmetics sales director who was one of two salespeople to pay up after receiving letters from the city, will be reimbursed for what she had complained was an outrageous fee. "Fayetteville's tax rate is expected to rise by almost 2.2 percent, or a penny, this year to boost law enforcement, a majority of the City Council agreed Monday night. Seven of the 10 council members, including the mayor, said they would support a budget proposal made at a work session that would raise the city tax levy by 1 cent. The new tax revenues -- about \$1.3 million annually -- would be used toward the hiring of 15 more police officers and construction of a police district office. The same budget proposal ironed out Monday would not include any of the fee increases recommended by City Manager Ted Voorhees on May 6, and the proposal would not raise taxes to build more parks or swimming pools. "I think that seems to be a consensus," Mayor Tony Chavonne said. The mayor directed Voorhees to incorporate the council-driven changes for final adoption at next Monday's scheduled meeting, when a public hearing on the new fiscal 2014 budget will be held. Fiscal 2014 starts July 1. The city's current levy is 45.6 cents for every \$100 in assessed value. Adding a penny to the tax rate would cost the owner of a \$150,000 home \$15 more each year. Chavonne and the following six council members said they would support the budget proposal reached Monday night: Keith Bates, Robert Massey, D.J. Haire, Bobby Hurst, Bill Crisp and Val Applewhite." The plan, made last week in light of looming budget challenges out of Raleigh and a recent court ruling in favor of the sweepstakes gaming industry, avoids a penny increase on the tax rate and forgoes the new 15 officers. The plan trims \$2 million of planned spending from savings and gives employees 2 percent "merit" raises. Councilman Bobby Hurst made the motion to support the proposal. "I believe that the city manager's budget is a conservative approach," Hurst said. "No tax increase." Councilman Keith Bates seconded the motion. Little discussion followed, except to clarify the motion. Mayor Pro Tem Jim Arp cast the dissenting vote, saying the city could pursue the 15 officers through the grant without a tax increase. "If police is our No. 1 priority," Arp said, "we could have found the money, if we had wanted to find it." Mayor Tony Chavonne said the lopsided vote was a surprise. "This is a compromise," Chavonne said after the meeting. "But in light of the uncertainty out there, a majority of the council members recognize that this is the best they could do at this time." The plan totals \$200 million -- or about 6.5 percent more

The 6-2 vote was a relief to Lisa Pia and her husband, Bobby Tibbetts, who want permission to keep their year-old pot-bellied pig named Loopey. They live in College Lakes off Ramsey Street. "We aren't happy that we can't take her home tonight, but we are happy to get six votes," Lisa Pia said. The couple brought two of their children, Anthony Pia, who is 8, and Victoria Pia, who is 10. All four wore matching white T-shirts that read: "Loopey for Autism. Bring Anthony's Pet Home." Anthony, who is autistic, is especially attached to the pig. The family sees the animal as therapeutic for the boy. They bought the piglet last year unaware of the city's ban on swine. Family members returned the pig to a ranch last month after they learned of the city prohibition. Their plight made national headlines last weekend after the story was first reported. Because of that interest and the family's

attendance at its meeting Monday, the council moved the discussion toward the top of the work session agenda. Voting for the staff direction to rethink the pig ban were Ted Mohn, Charles Evans, Mayor Tony Chavonne, D.J. Haire, Bill Crisp and Keith Bates. Lisa Pia and Bobby Tibbetts say the pig is therapeutic for their autistic 8-yearold son, Anthony. The 80-pound pig had a shelter in the backyard and slept on a pillow in Anthony's room at night. "How can you do this to a child?" Pia asked after the vote. Tibbetts said too much attention has been misplaced on the pig. "It's about our son," he said. "Nobody cares about him." Council members discussed whether they set a precedent by allowing Loopey to live inside the city limits. "It's not a service animal by law," said council member Bill Crisp, who voted against the exception. "It does not meet the federal or state criteria for a service animal. That could very well open Pandora's box." Council member Val Applewhite said resident hogs might hurt property values and generate bad odors. "Are people able to enjoy their property?" she asked." Applewhite has signaled she will rubberstamp Gov. Cooper's agenda as a legislator. Applewhite has stated that she supports Cooper's proposal to ramp up spending on education.

On healthcare, Applewhite appears to support the expansion of the government's involvement. Specifically, Applewhite strongly supports Medicaid expansion. As the southeastern organizer for Democracy North Carolina, Applewhite indicated her support for the NAACP's efforts to fight for Medicaid expansion.

On issues of public safety, Applewhite may have several vulnerabilities. Applewhite's previous political opponents have highlighted that crime "increased every year while Applewhite was on the [Fayetteville] council". Additionally, in 2020, Applewhite declined to appear with former Mayor Michael Bloomberg over his previous support for common-sense crime prevention policies.

Curiously, in 2012, Applewhite voted against a resolution declaring Dimona, Israel to be the 'Sister City' of Fayetteville.

Finally, Applewhite is fairly left-leaning on social issues. It should be noted that Applewhite is a supporter of Black Lives Matter and opposed a civil war history museum in Fayetteville. Recently, Applewhite assumedly reaffirmed her support for abortion.

Most of the City Council said Wednesday they wanted to ban commercial peddlers, except those selling seasonal goods such as fireworks or produce. The ban would not apply to nonprofit groups, such as churches and the Salvation Army, or vendors who sell prepared food at kiosks. The council directed city staff to finish drafting an ordinance that could be presented as soon as next month. Whether a public hearing will be held before the vote has not been announced vet. Roadside vendors are currently legal. There are 168 traveling peddlers with city licenses, plus six itinerant merchants who pay small fees to hawk their wares. Many set up along major roads on weekends when enforcement is lax, officials said. Councilman D.J. Haire said some business owners say peddlers appear near their stores with lower-priced -- and sometimes worthless -- goods. "It makes it difficult for them," he said. Assistant City Manager Doug Hewett said he was presenting the proposed ban Wednesday after some shopkeepers and residents have complained to city officials about the vendors. Councilman Charles Evans asked Hewett if the city derives any benefits from roadside vendors. Hewett said that given their proliferation, their unattractiveness and the complaints they have generated, no. "I would say we don't enjoy any benefits from them," Hewett said. With a show of hands, the council voted 9-1 to tentatively approve the concept of a ban and ask for a final vote at a later council meeting. The clerk said she intended to clarify the vote tally after the meeting. The minutes are unofficial until the council adopts them at a later meeting. On Tuesday, the mayor gave the following account as to how the votes fell: -- Voting for the fares and tax increases were Applewhite, Chavonne, Charles Evans, D.J. The City Council took that action Monday after listening to several residents, including at least three pastors representing their congregations, lament the inadequate and unreliable service of the Favetteville Area System of Transit. The Rev. Brian Thompson, pastor of Simon Temple AME Zion Church, said he recently rode the bus and invited the council members to do the same. "It's a shame before God, and it's a disgrace," he said. The plan trims \$2 million of planned spending from savings and gives employees 2 percent "merit" raises. Councilman Bobby Hurst made the motion to support the proposal. "I believe that the city manager's budget is a conservative approach," Hurst said. "No tax increase." Councilman Keith Bates seconded the motion. Little discussion followed, except to clarify the motion. Mayor Pro Tem Jim Arp cast the dissenting vote, saying the city could pursue the 15 officers through the grant without a tax increase. "If police is our No. 1 priority," Arp said, "we could have found the money, if we had wanted to find it." Mayor Tony Chavonne said the lopsided vote was a surprise. "This is a compromise," Chavonne said after the meeting. "But in light of the uncertainty out there, a majority of the council members recognize that this is the best they could do at this time." The plan totals \$200 million -- or about 6.5 percent more over last year -- for the fiscal 2014, which starts next week. For more than a month, the council had been debating a new spending plan and a possible tax increase for police." (*The Fayetteville Observer*, 6/25/13)

Annexation

In February 2008, Applewhite Was Known To Be Opposed To Annexing The Gates Four Development. "Some of the most recently elected council members rose to political prominence because of the Big Bang -- most notably, Bill Crisp and Ted Mohn. Councilwoman Val Applewhite's defeat of longtime Councilman Curtis Worthy was heavily aided by long-smoldering resentment for his pro-annexation vote. Now, it's coming back yet again. On June 30, the city's five-year agreement to exempt the Gates Four development from the annexation will expire. On June 30, 2009, the city could complete the necessary steps to make the exclusive, gated subdivision part of Fayetteville. It's tempting. Gates Four is a pot of gold at the end of Fayetteville's rainbow. Its 610 homes have an average tax value of \$225,000 -- higher than many city neighborhoods. At today's tax rate, it would add nearly \$800,000 a year to the city's treasury, at little added expense. Four council members favor annexing Gates Four as soon as it's legally possible. Three more, including the mayor, say they're leaning that way. Only Crisp, Mohn and Applewhite firmly oppose it." (*The Fayetteville Observer*, 2/12/08)

Parking

In November 2008, Applewhite Opposed Negotiating "A Two-Year Lease To Reopen A Downtown Parking Lot That Merchants Say Is Vital To Business." 'The Fayetteville City Council agreed Monday to try to negotiate a two-year lease to reopen a downtown parking lot that merchants say is vital to business. The decision came after a contentious debate on whether buying the lot on Hay Street or entering into a long-term lease was a good investment. Councilman Keith Bates worried if the council did nothing and left the 44-space lot closed, progress to improve the city center would stall. Councilwoman Val Applewhite disagreed. She said the city has supported various downtown initiatives, but it should not invest in this lot, which is in the 100 block of Hay Street next to the Gotham building. "Our focus has to be much greater than downtown," she said. "There are needs across this city that are great." The city had leased the lot from BB&T since 1988 and operated it as a public parking lot. In April, the bank said it wanted to sell the property. A majority on the City Council in September decided against buying the property for an asking price of \$395,000." (*The Fayetteville Observer*, 11/25/08)

In April 2010, Applewhite Voted Against "A Plan To Borrow \$5.9 Million For A Four-Level Parking Deck Off Franklin Street That Will Connect To The Robert C. Williams Business Center." "Construction on Fayetteville's first public parking deck downtown could start by the end of this year. The City Council agreed Tuesday to support a plan to borrow \$5.9 million for a four-level parking deck off Franklin Street that will connect to the Robert C. Williams Business Center. The business center is also known by its owner, the Public Works Commission. Tuesday's 6-2 vote to proceed with the deck's architectural and engineering work marks a big step toward the city's long-held goal of a parking deck downtown. Until now, there was no political support to pay for a deck. City officials say the parking problem will worsen as the city center continues to grow. Last year, the council instituted paid parking in several municipal lots in anticipation of building a deck one day. Voting for the deck were Mayor Tony Chavonne, Mayor Pro Tem D.J. Haire and Keith Bates, Kady-Ann Davy, Bobby Hurst and Bill Crisp. Voting against the deck were Val Applewhite and Ted Mohn. Robert Massey and Wesley Meredith were absent." (*The Fayetteville Observer*, 4/7/10)

Condemnation

In November 2009, Applewhite Was Among The Fayetteville Councilmembers To Vote In Favor Of Beginning Condemnation Proceedings On Several Privately Owned Lots For A New Transit Transfer Station. "On Nov. 9, the City Council voted to begin condemnation proceedings for her parcel after she refused to consider selling it, city officials said. The condemned lot is one of seven parcels that comprise a city block -- bounded by Robeson, Franklin, Winslow and West Russell streets -- where the city wants to put a new Fayetteville Area System of Transit transfer station. In a memo this month, City Attorney Karen McDonald said officials began pursuing acquisition of the property after the council voted in December to put the transfer station at that location. That was before Pfendler bought the land. A city appraiser said the land is worth \$210,000. The county Tax Office lists its value at \$218,000. The council's vote to condemn Pfendler's land was 6-3. Voting for the condemnation were Mayor Tony Chavonne, Charles Evans, Robert Massey, Bobby Hurst, Val Applewhite and Wesley Meredith. Voting against were Ted Mohn, Bill Crisp and D.J. Haire. "I don't like taking people's property like that," Crisp said this week. "I just think we need to negotiate the sale of properties instead of condemn properties. That's just my philosophy." Craig Hampton, the city's special projects director, said officials expect to be able to buy the other six parcels that make up the block without the need for eminent domain." Zoning

In April 2010, Applewhite Voted For "A Staff Request To Halt Zoning And Planning Requests" For 90 Days. "In other business, the council voted down a staff request to halt zoning and planning requests. Rob Anderson, the city's chief development officer sought a 90-day moratorium to speed up the process of drafting a new ordinance, which could take until the fall. "There are big projects in the pipeline now," Chavonne said, in opposition to the moratorium. "So do we tell them to talk to Moore County and develop it there?" Bates and Applewhite voted for the moratorium." (*The Fayetteville Observer*, 4/7/10)

In March 2011, "Voted 7-3, With Ted Mohn, Val Applewhite And D.J. Haire Against, To Spend \$50,000, Which Already Was Budgeted, Toward The Development Of New Tourism Signs Downtown." "Voted 7-3, with Ted Mohn, Val Applewhite and D.J. Haire against, to spend \$50,000, which already was budgeted, toward the development of new tourism signs downtown. The project's \$450,000 cost includes money from various outside sources. Voting for the \$50,000 allocation were Mayor Tony Chavonne, Keith Bates, Kady-Ann Davy, Robert Massey, Bobby Hurst, Jim Arp and Bill Crisp." (*The Fayetteville Observer*, 3/29/11)

Notable Project Decisions

In December 2007, Applewhite Voted Against Approving "The Construction Of A 90-Bed, \$8 Million Skilled Nursing Home On 71st School Road, Off Old Bunce Road." "Voted 8-2 to approve the construction of a 90-bed, \$8 million skilled nursing home on 71st School Road, off Old Bunce Road. The project is a joint venture between Autumn Corp. and Cape Fear Valley Health System. The council approved the project with conditions, including that the developer align the entrance of the planned nursing home with the existing entrance on 71st School Road to the Remington subdivision, as well as improve that new intersection with turn and deceleration lanes. One Remington neighbor, Nathaniel Patillo, worried about increased traffic on an already busy two-lane road. Voting against the project were Val Applewhite and D.J. Haire." (*The Fayetteville Observer*, 12/18/07)

Parks And Recreation

In 2012 And 2013, Applewhite "Vocally Fought Against Holding A \$45 Million Referendum Last Winter To Build More Parks, Swimming Pools And Ball Fields." "Joining them in the hour long debate in the Council Chambers were the other three mayoral candidates: former four-term Councilman Nat Robertson, former three-term Councilman Paul Williams and retired tire maker Charles Ragan. About 150 people were in the audience. Without naming anyone, DeViere took a jab at Applewhite, who vocally fought against holding a \$45 million referendum last winter to build more parks, swimming pools and ball fields. Applewhite publicly clashed with the park plan's chief supporter, outgoing Mayor Tony Chavonne, who is not seeking re-election. "The bond was another example of where we let conflict and divisiveness hurt the greater good," deViere said. Applewhite defended her stance on the issue, which stalled last November by a 5-5 vote of the council. "That park bond was a back-door deal," she said." (*The Fayetteville Observer*, 10/2/13)

In 2016, Applewhite Noted Her Opposition To A \$35 Million Parks Bond. "Eight former members of the Fayetteville City Council have come out against the \$35 million parks bond that goes before voters next month. Curtis Worthy, a former councilman who is chairman of the Vote No Bond Tax referendum committee, identified the others as Johnny Dawkins, Robert Massey, Paul Williams, Don Talbot, Val Applewhite, Juanita Gonzalez and Lois Kirby. All of them, including Worthy, had council terms that extended into the early to mid-2000s. They are a mix of Republicans and Democrats. Applewhite, who served on the council from 2007 to 2011, twice ran for mayor, losing close elections both times. The referendum committee, which can raise and spend money on advertising, was organized last month to urge Fayetteville voters to reject the

bond issue that will be on the March 15 primary ballots. Worthy said he and other committee members don't oppose new parks and recreational amenities. Rather, he said, they oppose the estimated city tax increase of 1.35 cents per \$100 for each \$100 in tax value that would be needed to retire the general-obligation bond debt." In August 2009, Applewhite Was One Of Only Two Councilmembers To Vote Against **Directing Staff Members To Research Revision Of An Ordinance Barring Hogs Inside** Fayetteville And To Allow Domesticated Pigs As Pets. "The Fayetteville City Council agreed to direct staff members to research what would be needed to revise an ordinance now barring hogs inside the city and allow domesticated pigs as pets. The 6-2 vote was a relief to Lisa Pia and her husband, Bobby Tibbetts, who want permission to keep their year-old pot-bellied pig named Loopey. They live in College Lakes off Ramsey Street. "We aren't happy that we can't take her home tonight, but we are happy to get six votes," Lisa Pia said. The couple brought two of their children, Anthony Pia, who is 8, and Victoria Pia, who is 10. All four wore matching white Tshirts that read: "Loopey for Autism. Bring Anthony's Pet Home." Anthony, who is autistic, is especially attached to the pig. The family sees the animal as therapeutic for the boy. They bought the piglet last year unaware of the city's ban on swine. Family members returned the pig to a ranch last month after they learned of the city prohibition. Their plight made national headlines last weekend after the story was first reported. Because of that interest and the family's attendance at its meeting Monday, the council moved the discussion toward the top of the work session agenda. Voting for the staff direction to rethink the pig ban were Ted Mohn, Charles Evans, Mayor Tony Chavonne, D.J. Haire, Bill Crisp and Keith Bates. Voting against the idea were Val Applewhite and Mayor Pro Tem Wesley Meredith. Neither could be reached for comment after the meeting." (The Fayetteville Observer, 8/4/09)

Applewhite Voted Against Amending The Pig Ban Despite The Request To Do So From A Family With A Pot Bellied Pig As A Pet With Therapeutic Purposes For Their Autistic Son. "The Fayetteville Observer reported Wednesday that the city council deadlocked 5-5 on a proposal that would have allowed Loopey to return from a ranch to its home in a city subdivision. The council considered giving the city manager authority to grant exemptions to the hog ban under conditions that included a doctor's note saying the animal was needed to help treat a medical ailment. Lisa Pia and Bobby Tibbetts say the pig is therapeutic for their autistic 8-year-old son, Anthony. The 80-pound pig had a shelter in the backyard and slept on a pillow in Anthony's room at night. "How can you do this to a child?" Pia asked after the vote. Tibbetts said too much attention has been misplaced on the pig. "It's about our son," he said. "Nobody cares about him." Council members discussed whether they set a precedent by allowing Loopey to live inside the city limits. "It's not a service animal by law," said council member Bill Crisp, who voted against the exception. "It does not meet the federal or state criteria for a service animal. That could very well open Pandora's box." Council member Val Applewhite said resident hogs might hurt property values and generate bad odors. "Are people able to enjoy their property?" she asked." Labor

In 2013, "The AFL-CIO Union And Local Democratic Party Endorsed Applewhite." "In 2013, Applewhite, a city councilwoman, was running for mayor against Nat Robertson, a Republican and former councilman. Municipal races are officially nonpartisan but party politics entered the race, especially down the stretch. The council's four Republicans sent out a negative letter against Applewhite, and a real-estate group, which backed a slate of GOP candidates, also supported Robertson. Meanwhile, the AFL-CIO union and local Democratic Party endorsed Applewhite." (*The Fayetteville Observer*, 3/16/20)

Stop And Frisk

In 2020, Applewhite Declined To Appear With Former Mayor Michael Bloomberg Amid His Previous Support For Stop And Frisk Policies. "Some Democrats have been critical of Bloomberg because when he was the mayor of New York he had a "stop-and-frisk" policy. Police stopped people on the street and searched them without a warrant or other specific cause that could be legally justified. The policy was used heavily on minorities and eventually found to be unconstitutional. Prominent Fayetteville Democrat Val Applewhite was to appear with Bloomberg during his visit on Jan. 3, but she canceled. On Facebook this month, Applewhite said the stop-and-frisk issue was one reason she changed her mind. Bloomberg has apologized for the policy, The New York Times reported." In January 2012, Applewhite Voted Against A Measure Suspending Police Consent Searches During Traffic Stops. "Starting this week, Fayetteville police can't ask drivers for consent to search them, their passengers or their vehicles during a traffic stop until an independent review is completed. The Fayetteville City Council voted 8-2 on Monday night to impose the moratorium until members of the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives complete a review into the controversial practice. The lead consultant for the review will be Jimmy L. Wilson, a retired Washington, D.C., deputy police chief. Wilson is expected to begin his work today by visiting the Police Department, City Manager Dale Iman said. His team will join him Wednesday, Iman said. The review, along with a final report and future presentation to the council, is expected to take less than two months, Iman said. The contract with the organization will cost the city about \$30,000. Iman said the team's review will include interviews with local residents and elected officials and an analysis of traffic-stop data. The moratorium is to last four months -- or until the review is done. During the moratorium, 53 additional patrol cars will be equipped with cameras. Iman said the camera installations would be done by early March. Voting for the moratorium were Mayor Tony Chavonne, Mayor Pro Tem Jim Arp, Kady-Ann Davy, Robert Massey, D.J. Haire, Bobby Hurst, Bill Crisp and Wade Fowler. Voting against the moratorium were Keith Bates and Val Applewhite." (The Fayetteville *Observer*, 1/24/12)

In 2015, "In Another Robertson Mailer That Went To Some Voters Friday, He Said Crime Increased Every Year While Applewhite Was On The Council, And He Said She Voted Against A City Budget In 2009 That Would Have Used Grant Money To Hire More Police Officers." "He narrowly defeated her two years ago in an open mayoral seat. Their rematch is Tuesday, when the polls are open. His advertising mailer is the first this season to criticize a candidate. Robertson mailed several pieces to voters, ahead of the Oct. 3 primary, that stuck to positive themes. In another Robertson mailer that went to some voters Friday, he said crime increased every year while Applewhite was on the council, and he said she voted against a city budget in 2009 that would have used grant money to hire more police officers. Applewhite has said she opposed the budget that year because of its inequality over city employee pay raises. Peddlers

In June 2008, Applewhite Was The Only Fayetteville Councilmember To Vote Against A Tentative Ban On Roadside Peddlers. "The city of Fayetteville is one step closer to shutting down roadside peddlers, which some see as a growing and unscrupulous blight along major thoroughfares. Most of the City Council said Wednesday they wanted to ban commercial peddlers, except those selling seasonal goods such as fireworks or produce. The ban would not apply to nonprofit groups, such as churches and the Salvation Army, or vendors who sell prepared food at kiosks. The council directed city staff to finish drafting an ordinance that could be presented as soon as next month. Whether a public hearing will be held before the vote has not been announced yet. Roadside vendors are currently legal. There are 168 traveling peddlers with city licenses, plus six itinerant merchants who pay small fees to hawk their wares. Many set up along major roads on weekends when enforcement is lax, officials said. Councilman D.J. Haire said some business owners say peddlers appear near their stores with lower-priced -- and sometimes worthless -- goods. "It makes it difficult for them," he said. Assistant City Manager Doug Hewett said he was presenting the proposed ban Wednesday after some shopkeepers and residents have complained to city officials about the vendors. Councilman Charles Evans asked Hewett if the city derives any benefits from roadside vendors. Hewett said that given their proliferation, their unattractiveness and the complaints they have generated, no. "I would say we don't enjoy any benefits from them," Hewett said. With a show of hands, the council voted 9-1 to tentatively approve the concept of a ban and ask for a final vote at a later council meeting. Councilwoman Val Applewhite cast the only dissenting vote." (The Fayetteville Observer, 6/19/08)

Drug Addiction Counseling

In March 2010, Applewhite Was Among 7 Fayetteville Councilmembers To Vote Against A Rezoning Request To Allow A Church To Expand Its Counseling Program For Drug Addicts And Alcoholics. "A western Fayetteville church will not be allowed to expand its counseling program for drug addicts and alcoholics. Jesus' Peace Ministries wanted to operate Multicultural Resources Center Inc. -- a for-profit corporation formed in December by church officials -- in its old sanctuary on the church campus. The church opened in 1997 on the edge of Lake Rim Estates, which is off Rim Road. It built a larger sanctuary last year. Church officials needed to rezone the land from an agricultural-residential district to a commercial one with conditions before the for-profit company could operate there. The new district would have been limited only to a substance abuse treatment center during normal business hours, according to a revised request the church presented Monday before the Fayetteville City Council. The council voted 7-3 to deny the request and, in effect, prevent the for-profit drug treatment program from operating on the ground property. Voting to deny the request were Mayor Tony Chavonne, Keith Bates, Bobby Hurst, Bill Crisp, Val Applewhite, Ted Mohn and Wesley Meredith. Voting in favor were Mayor Pro Tem D.J. Haire, Robert Massey and Kady-Ann Davy." (*The Fayetteville Observer*, 3/23/10)

Campaign Finance Complaints

In 2007, A Fayetteville Man Filed A Campaign Finance Complaint Alleging That Corporate Phones Belonging To Reed Lallier Chevrolet Were Used For A Phone Bank To Support Applewhite's Fayetteville City Council Campaign. "A man active in Fayetteville politics filed a campaign finance complaint Friday against Reed Lallier Chevrolet. The complaint, filed just before 5 p.m. by Robert Anderson, alleges the business's telephones were used for a phone bank supporting Fayetteville City Council candidates Ted Mohn and Val Applewhite, which could amount to an in-kind donation. Donations to political campaigns by corporations are illegal. Both candidates will be charged for the time they used the business and its phones, said Mike Lallier, owner of Reed Lallier Chevrolet, making the issue of illegal donations moot. "I imagine it'll amount to \$3 or \$4 per phone, times four phones," Lallier said, explaining that he will charge the candidates a fraction of the monthly phone bill for the two days the phones were used. Gary Bartlett, executive director of the State Board of Elections, said it's impossible to determine whether any law has been violated until the candidates file their final finance reports after the Tuesday elections." "I am requesting that the Board of Elections conduct an investigation to determine whether there is and has been a coordinated effort by the Val Applewhite campaign, or others, to offer free food and beverages, round trip transportation to and from the BOE polling site, and other amenities to voters in exchange for their vote, or to influence their decision to vote," Devore said in a letter to county Elections Director Terri Robertson. Devore's complaint is based on the activities of Swan Davis of Let's Make It Happen Inc., a nonprofit community organization that conducts charitable activities."
